Readings - Lectio Divina

I invite you to ponder on the readings by reading the words slowly the first time then reading them again allowing the meaning to deepen into feeling, and being drawn to certain sentences or words and allowing them to hold your attention, until your mind becomes silent and you prayerfully experience the truth of the promise of which the text speaks.

Psalm 23

The Lord is my shepherd therefore can I lack nothing.

He makes me lie down in green pastures and leads me beside still waters.

He shall refresh my soul and guide me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil;
for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.

You spread a table before me in the presence of those who trouble me;
you have anointed my head with oil and my cup shall be full.

Surely goodness and loving mercy shall follow me all the days of my life,
and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

The Gospel of John 11: 1-45

Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha.

Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill.

So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." But when Jesus heard it, he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was. Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again."

The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?"

Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because they see the light of this world. But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them."

After saying this, he told them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him." The disciples said to him, "Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right." Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. Then Jesus told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead. For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him." Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him."

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother.

When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary, and told her privately, "The Teacher is here and is calling for you." And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him.

Now Jesus had not yet come to the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him.

The Jews who were with her in the house, consoling her, saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see."

Jesus began to weep. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?" Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?"

So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. I knew that you

always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go." Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him.

The Sermon "I am the Resurrection and the Life" John 11:1-45



In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen.

One of my greatest fears is being buried alive and waking up in a coffin. I know its illogical, but I have a great imagination and have had lots of near misses; trampled by horses, falling off mountains 5000m up, bikes, trees, storms, an octopus, snakes and more. I figure I will go home to God when it's my time. But, I'm not sure what to do about this fear of being buried alive. Perhaps tell my kids to make sure I'm dead, wait ten days, then bury me with a fully charged mobile phone. I hope there's reception down there. My fears began when I heard the story about a Chinese lady in her eighties. Her family thought she was dead. Seven days later she woke up during the burial rituals and got up and made dinner. I figure that would be my luck, having had so many close calls.

Strangely though, today's gospel isn't about death. It's about life.

Mary, Martha and Lazarus are friends of Jesus and he loves them. Mary sends a message to Jesus saying: "Lord, the one you love is ill."

Most people would rush to their friend's bedside. Although I don't know what I would do if my friend had Coronavirus. Would I rush to their bedside? I'd feel torn. Wanting to protect my family and obey the law and wanting to go and comfort my friend. Jesus responds in a strange way. He says his friend's illness doesn't lead to death but is for God's glory. Perhaps when John wrote his gospel, he was looking back on what happened to Lazarus and on Jesus death on the cross where he was glorified. His disciples must have wondered why he waited two days to go to his friend and Mary and Martha must have waited and waited, hoping he would come.

Suddenly after two days, he says let's go. His disciples react with fear, for people tried to stone Jesus at Bethany. Jesus isn't concerned about people not understanding. He says: "*Lazarus is asleep*." The disciples see that as a way out where they don't have to go.

Jesus insists on going. Thomas, the one who didn't believe Jesus had been raised by God and who insisted on seeing Jesus and putting his fingers into Jesus wounds, is fearful.

He says: "Let us go and die with you."

By the time they get to Bethany Lazarus had been dead for four days.

Martha hears about Jesus arrival and goes out to meet him. She rebukes him: "Lord, if you had been here my brother would not have died." She knows Jesus as the miracle worker, yet she acknowledges God will do whatever Jesus asks.

Jesus promises her that her brother will rise again but she doesn't understand and thinks he means the final resurrection at the end times, which people believed was the time all people rose out of their graves and went to heaven.

Jesus shares with Martha a profound truth: "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die will live and everyone who believes in me will never die."

He asks her: Do you believe? And she says: "Yes, Lord I believe you are the Messiah, the Son of God."

Martha returns home and tells Mary the teacher is calling her and Mary sets off to find Jesus and is followed by a group of people who were grieving with her, the very ones who tried to stone Jesus.

Mary kneels at Jesus feet. Perhaps this symbolised her worshipping him as the Lord, God with us. She rebukes him, saying the same thing her sister said: "Lord, if you had been here my brother would not have died." Yet Mary more than Martha, knows of Jesus true identity.

Jesus is deeply moved and disturbed and asks to be taken to the tomb of Lazarus. The crowd invite him: "*To come and see.*" What a strange invitation. The very same invitation given to those wanting to become Jesus disciples.

When they arrive at the tomb Jesus begins to weep. The crowds say: "See how he loved him." Their hearts seem fickle. Stone him one minute, feel sympathy for him the next. Perhaps love and grief has brought them all together. Yet they rebuke him too, for not coming and working a miracle to heal Lazarus. After all he healed the blind man.

Jesus, deeply grieved, asks for the stone to the tomb to be rolled back. Martha, always practical warns that the body will smell. Jesus reminds her that he had promised if she believed she would see the glory of God.

Jesus with absolute trust and faith, looks up to heaven to God and thanks God for hearing him. He cries out with a loud voice: "Lazarus come out!"

We are told the dead man comes out, still wrapped in cloths and Jesus asks the people to unbind him. They were Jewish and were able to touch him, for he wasn't dead and unclean. Lazarus was alive. God had raised him from the dead.

After this many people believed in Jesus and because of Lazarus, also believed. This led to the religious leaders being afraid of so many people believing in Jesus, afraid that the Romans would come and destroy them, so they began to plot to kill both of them.



The story of Lazarus is a powerful story of hope. Most of us have encountered death and our belief in Jesus can reassure us that we live in eternal life, now and forever.

We know God's love for us is greater than death. The good news is because of our faith in Jesus, we can live our lives where this hope sustains us.

I once met a holy man called Brother Angelo on a flight from Rome to Jerusalem. He was from the Little Family of the Resurrection. Their monastery was on the Mount of Olives and it was a closed order. Yet, there he was sitting beside me wearing a long white robe, he had a long beard, was very tall with long legs and arms and hands and he spoke with me and shared his wisdom with me. He said this life is preparation for the next life. What he said made me think about what I need to do, to prepare for the next life. I believe Jesus commandment to love God with all our being and others as ourselves, is the best preparation for the next life.

We can look to how Jesus lived his life. We can look to him as an example. We saw from today's gospel Jesus had complete trust in God and believed God heard his prayers and listened to him.

There is more to today's gospel. It comes at a time when we are journeying towards the cross. God raising Lazarus from the dead points towards the resurrection of Jesus.

It is a taste of things to come. It is meant to sustain us through the challenging Lenten and Easter Journey, especially the passion where Jesus suffered, because Jesus story of suffering touches upon all our stories of suffering. We make connections between his story and our own stories.

Today's gospel is meant to offer us hope and light in the challenging times we now face. It helps us keep in mind that new life and resurrection comes at the end of the journey.
