
Introduction To Worship Christmas Day 25th December 2020





In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen




St Paul's Cathedral's doors were locked!

It's been a challenging year for all of us, where some of us may be feeling tired or have heavy hearts. I made a quick visit to the CBD and it seemed as if there wasn't much life wasn't there. Most people haven't returned to work yet, so it's not crowded.

The graffiti in the laneways seems dark and there are homeless people sitting around in lanes.

Some have their beds set up for the night in sheltered places, blankets and doonas nicely folded up on the footpaths. A man was busking, playing an assortment of metal bits and pieces. No one seemed to be smiling and there was a heaviness I can't describe, a lack of Christmas cheer. Perhaps I looked in the wrong places. Perhaps there is a quiet despair in people's hearts, and they feel weighted down and burdened. I've heard some young people have developed mental health issues. It's been hard on us all. A year that began with bush fires and masks and moved into a pandemic with lockdown and more masks. There have been tragic losses of life due to COVID-19 and some families didn't get to say goodbye to their loved ones and this will be their first Christmas without them. It's been a year when many have felt isolated, limited, lonely and afraid and we still fear a third wave. This Christmas will be a challenge for many in the UK, USA, South America and Europe and so many other places. Thank God we are able to spend time with our loved ones in Victoria. Pray for those who can't be with loved ones.



We might ask: How do we find hope, with all this darkness happening in the world? Where is the Christmas Spirit hiding? It's said that the remedy for despair is hope. We may have had our freedoms restrained this year, but there is a greater freedom in God and in the freedom of our hearts. A freedom where we choose how we respond to this darkness and fear.

We remember Christ's light overcomes the darkness of the world. The prologue of John's gospel speaks of us being enlightened by the Light of the world. We may ponder on this and how our obedient faith has brought us through hardship, challenges and loss. Christians are a stubborn lot and don't give up easily. Doors to many churches may be locked this Christmas Day for the first time in many years, perhaps since the Spanish flu, but we're not locked out from God. God is bigger than a building. After thousands of years, God has returned to our homes. That is the miracle of this Christmas.

We will celebrate Christmas in our homes with our loved ones. It will be a Christmas where we're reminded of how we're fragile, vulnerable and humble, like Jesus was when he was a baby. It is amazing when we think about God coming to us in Jesus, as a tiny fragile and vulnerable baby and how he grew up to teach us and speak words of hope for us. When we receive those words and Jesus into our hearts and choose to believe in Jesus, we become God's children. When we open our hearts to God and choose to be open to God's grace, and wonder at all God does for us, Jesus is born into our hearts. That is when we find joy. In the midst of the darkness, we find joy. We can choose to be joyful in any situation.

It helps to look at the big picture. Today's three readings are about the big picture. God as creator is the same always and we can wonder about how God spoke to create the universe and how thousands of years passed, and God spoke through the prophets.

Now God speaks to us through Jesus, Jesus who was with God before the beginning of creation. In Jesus is our life and that life is our light and this light shines into the darkness of the world and into passing moments such as bushfires and pandemics, into all circumstances and it reminds us our God reigns over all times and situations.

Consider how over two billion Christians will celebrate Christmas this year. They will invite wonder and joy into their celebrations. Imagine Jesus walking along the peaceful shores of Lake Galilee calling fishermen to be his disciples. That is how our faith began. Now Christianity has travelled to the ends of the earth offering people hope and love and blessing, so many people who have witnessed the glory of God in their lives.

God's word is powerful and life changing. Allow it to change your hearts this Christmas. Consider the readings and ponder on them. Take time out to pray and give thanks to God for bringing your loved ones and you through a tough year. Sing carols joyfully and invite others to join you. Phone people up and sing with them. Invite family, friends and neighbours over and sing with them and watch the inspirational YouTubes'.
You will find your hearts being lifted. Do not allow the darkness of the world to overcome your joy and the life you find in Jesus. Ask God to lift up your hearts and fill them with joy.

This is not a normal Christmas. I've had a few abnormal Christmas days in my time. I'm sure you have too. My dad built himself a brick home on a thirty-acre block when I was in my early twenties.
I'm the oldest of seven children. So, we're having Christmas lunch and all of a sudden, the dining room is full of blowflies and it's not easy to enjoy a meal in those circumstances. The problem was dad forgot to seal the chimney and that's where they were getting in. Meanwhile we are waiting for my little brother.
He had decided to give dad a surprise present and had been delayed. He arrived with a van and opened it and out jumped a heifer and it ran straight into the orchard and headed for the fruit trees. Out ran dad and my sister and they started chasing it around and around the orchard, with its tail straight up. It was enjoying its freedom. Apparently, it took my brother over an hour to get it into the van. They finally got it into a paddock and sat down again amongst the blowflies and finished their Christmas lunch.

Why am I telling this story? It reminds me of the chaos of lockdown when my daughter took over my office to work from home, I got the library/family room and my granddaughter got the kitchen for home schooling and we all took turns teaching her. I'm sure many of our young families with school children and young adults at university can relate to this story. It was a year of family chaos and love.

A year of wonderful love where families supported one another, and our church families reached out to one another and pastorally cared for one another and we supported neighbours and friends and it seemed like the entire community was out there in our local parks greeting one another. It was a year when all the Whitehorse churches got together to care for the community and produce a Christmas video in partnership with

Whitehorse Council, Victoria Police and Eastern Health's Box Hill Hospital.

A year when Centre 81 partnered with the Police, and supported by the generosity of Mountview and Blackburn North/Nunawading members, the police distributed our hampers / care packages to those doing it tough. Members of Whitehorse Police were smiling when they came to collect the hampers. It must have given them hope to distribute them when their jobs are so challenging at times. And more hampers went out to those connected with Centre 81 and care packages to some of our members. We may not see these days again. It's been a year when we have been sustained by love, hope and our faith. Jesus, the light of the world has been at work in our hearts and has born into our hearts and homes. The miracle of this Christmas is Jesus is back in our homes, where the first Christmas's were celebrated. It is a moment in history
