
Lorianne Grant is planning on updating the notice board. Our message will be: Hope for the Best.



Sermon

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen

"I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know Him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance amongst the saints." Ephesians 1: 17-18

Francis of Assisi once said: "and when necessary, use words."

He knew words can be incarnate in our lives when they are made flesh and dwell among us. I've visited Assisi and the fern gullies where Francis once prayed. Nuns were singing in a nearby convert and the sound of their singing took me to another place, a place of serenity, faith and beauty. Life was so different when I was growing up. I heard stories about my great aunts who went to India as missionaries. They were my grandmother's sisters. One sister married someone from India, another rode horses until she was into her seventies and she gave me her jodhpurs when she heard I liked riding. Now missionaries come from India to our country, to suburbs where forty per cent of people have no faith. It is different world.

I attended the Pastors Breakfast on Thursday and heard about the Police handing out hampers to the needy in the community, hampers that will include the ones organised by Centre 81 during November and contributed to by Mountview and Blackburn North-Nunawading. Recently the police went to give a man a hamper and he said, 'Please give my hamper to a more needy family.' The hampers will give hope to those doing it tough this Christmas and to the Police who daily come face to face with suffering in our community.

The churches of Whitehorse as a group are reaching out to the needy in the community.

As we journey through Advent with the theme of hope, we will reach within ourselves to know God as God always reaches out to us.

Ken Gire tells the story of a missionary in his book: 'Windows of the Soul'. He was an English missionary whose mission board required him to keep detailed financial records for which he had to be skilled at double-entry bookkeeping, which he wasn't because he had no background in accounting or business. He only had a calling, to be a missionary. His balances were always off, and the separate accounts he was supposed to keep kept getting mixed, so the mission board released him. Unfit for the mission field, was their assessment, when in truth, he was only unfit for bookkeeping. He left without incident. Nobody knew where he went.

Years later a woman missionary visited a remote village to introduce people to Jesus.

She told them of His kindness and His love for the poor, how He went to their homes to eat with them, how He visited them when they were sick, How He fed the hungry, healed the sick, bound up the wounds of the broken-hearted and how children loved to follow him. The eyes of the people lit up, their faces beamed as they smiled and one of them exclaimed: "We know him! He has been living here for years!"

When they took her to see him, it was the man who years earlier had been dismissed by the mission board. He had settled there to do his work, sequestered from the double-entried tyranny of bookkeeping. Whenever anyone was sick, he visited them and waited up all night outside their home if necessary, checking on them, tending to their needs.

When they were hurt, he nursed their wounds. For the old and infirm, he brought food and water.

When Cholera broke out in the village he went from home to home, doing what he could to help.

Ken Gire asked: 'I wonder if someone were to come to our village or suburb and that person began to describe Jesus, would anybody hearing the description say: "We know him well! He's been living here for years!"'

Today's gospel invites us to become like this man. It seems like we are offered a stark choice, to love others and in turn love Jesus and find life, or to choose not to love others and in doing not love Jesus and not find life.

Paul in his letter to the Ephesians, and Mathew in his gospel, describe Jesus as the cosmic Christ. I read part of Mathew Fox's book about the cosmic Christ. He writes about worship bringing us closer to God and having the power to make and create people, to bring healing, to help us feel reverence for God, where worship is the playing out of the cosmic drama in our psyche. Worship is playful and lifts our spirits. The Holy Spirit is playful, uplifting, dramatic, fire, water, and breath, helping us to feel alive in Christ. At the same time, we also need silence in worship so we can draw nearer to God and know God in our hearts. Where we know we are loved and are empowered to bring God's love into the world.

There is something raw about truth and revelation, that can bring tears. When Christ was amongst us as a human being, thousands flocked to him to be healed. The invitation is still there to come to church and before God and with the support of our church family, show our pain and not hide it.

Fox says worship helps us bring our suffering to the universe, to God. All of us have suffered in some way. All of us are broken hearted in some way. Jesus continues to invite us to bring our burdens to him so he can take them from us and help us let them go, so the joy can come in.

The church is the place for lamentations, tiles of passage such as baptisms and confirmations, for us to respond to God and use our gifts for the building up of one another, for pastoral care, for singing, for preaching, for the Word, for prayer. For flowers and hospitality and celebration. For poetry, prophets and imagination.

For helping and administration and many more expressions of love for God and others.

Paul's letter to the Ephesians at Ephesus in Turkey, a Roman colony and health resort with Roman baths, a hospital, aqueducts, plumbing, a theatre, many homes, roller doors, a library and a brothel. It also was a home for Mary, the mother of Jesus and a church. The letter would have been read out to the congregation during worship. It is a prayer for the church where Paul gives thanks for their faith in Jesus and love for one another. Paul prays for God to give the congregation a spirit of wisdom and revelation through the Holy Spirit, so they may know God. He prays for the eyes of their hearts to be enlightened so they know the hope to which God has called them, through the power of God. We believe God has power over our lives, power which God put to work in Jesus Christ who God raised from the dead and seated at his right hand in heavenly places.



This hope is God's power which is greater than the cosmos, where God has put all things under Jesus feet and made him head over all things for the church, the body of Christ and in that body we are the fullness of Jesus Christ who is the fullness of God who fills us with the Holy Spirit. This is a powerful and mysterious image. Words alone are inadequate to describe the hope to which God has called us in and through Jesus Christ. The images of Jesus coming in all his glory to judge the nations is beyond our understanding. Yet, it is our hope. The gospel offers stark images of people being judged and separated by Jesus, into sheep and goats and wheat and weeds. What we do with our lives matters to God. The purpose of today's gospel is to offer people a choice to love others and in doing so, to love Jesus.

The gospel isn't wishy washy. Its feisty and in our face. It calls us to find life in Jesus and to be the body of Christ in the world. Australians are a practical lot who live out their faith helping their neighbour, especially when the chips are down. We have a reputation for compassion and caring. I'm sure each one of us has a story to share, about communities getting together to help people during tough times.

And these have been tough times.

So may the eyes of your heart be enlightened by the Holy Spirt so you may know the hope to which God has called you. I'll finish with words from the hymn: 'Come Down O Love Divine'.

I invite you to prayerfully meditate on the words. May they bless you.

Come down, O Love divine, seek now this soul of mine, and visit it with your own ardour glowing; O Comforter, draw near, within my heart appear and kindle it, your holy flame bestowing.

There let it freely burn,
till earthly passions turn
to dust and ashes, in its heat consuming;
and let your glorious light
shine ever on my sight
and clothe me round, the while my path illuming.

Let holy charity
my outer garment be,
and lowliness become my inner clothing:
true lowliness of heart,
which takes the humbler part
and for its own shortcomings weeps with loathing.

And so the yearning strong
with which the soul will long
shall far out pass the power of human telling;
for none can guess its grace
till we become the place
in which the Holy Spirit makes his dwelling.

Merciful God, we pray for your world and in particular today, for the South East Asian countries of: Brunei, Malaysia and Singapore.

Islam is the main religion of Brunei, practiced by 79% of the population. Although religious freedom is protected under the Bruneian constitution, Sharia Law, a strict Islamic penal code based on the Quran, is currently in place in Brunei. Public celebration of Christmas was made illegal in the country since 2014.

Islam is the dominant religion in Malaysia and is the country's official religion and is practiced by 61% of the population. Christianity is the third religion in Malaysia, practised by 9% of its population.

Religion in Singapore is characterised by a wide variety of religious beliefs and practices due to its diverse ethnic mix of peoples originating from various countries. Religion in Singapore encompasses Buddhism (33%), Christianity (19%), Islam (14%), Taoism (10%) and Hinduism (5%).

We pray for the Christians in these countries. In Malaysia, where there is presently surging numbers of a third wave of the COVID-19 virus cases, we pray for the front line workers, as they carry out the necessary measures to contain the pandemic.

We offer our prayers for the other churches in our region, in particular for the All Saints' Anglican Church, Mitcham. In the presbytery, we pray for the Rowville Uniting Church and UCA Presbytery's Tertiary Ministries Working Group.

Heavenly Father, we pray for your church here in Mountview and give thanks for the guidance provided by Rev. Tina for our church members and their families during these difficult times. We bring our concerns for those who are grieving, distressed, depressed or afraid, that they may be comforted, and their hearts lifted and filled with hope.

Keep us safe during the coming week and be with us in all we do.

Accept our prayers through Jesus Christ our Lord, who taught us to pray...




Psalm 100

Psalm 100 encourages us to shout with joy and worship God with gladness when we come to him with joyful songs. Like the people of ancient time, we long for music and singing. We look to the future with hope to the time when we can gather together and have a big sing and feast. Walter Brueggemann spoke of the psalms as expressions of reorientation, of times where we receive a gift and surprise. The kind of reorientation that comes when we least expect it. Life usually falls into patterns of wholeness where we do not expect reorientation where God is at work in our midst, transforming our lives for the better. The psalms promise a future where there is hope. They speak of God's power in the world, despite what we see all around us. Brueggemann said: 'sometimes in a world where the circumstances seem hopeless, a promissory word is all that stands between us and the chaos.' This hope can be a precious gift on which we are willing to stake anything on. This is the time to pray and hope, when there is uncertainty. John Chittister in her book, The Breath of the Soul, said: 'the purpose to prayer is to come to love God as much as possible, with all the insights into the nature and presence of God prayers brings us. The life of those who practise prayer deeply and regularly is a life of enlightenment. People who pray come to know the mind of God.

Any obstacles in their heart melts away.'

We can rejoice in the psalms and turn to God with prayer and find the hope we need for the journey.
