OPENING PRAYER:

We rejoice in our risen Lord and it is right that we should do so. But we must never allow his glory to overshadow his humanity. I have had the privilege of studying with Rev Kathy Galloway former Warden of the Iona Community and her prayer poem reflects this. Let us pray:

Here's a man, born to a mother who broke the rules and said 'yes'; parented by a man who was not his father, knowing his ancient lineage yet calling people to be born again into a new community.

Here's a man, tramping the dusty roads of his country, drawing inspiration from the land, loving its fruitfulness, sailing its waters, stilling its storms.

Here's a man, giving up a steady job to follow his calling, keeping bad company, often sleeping rough, touching people who were considered untouchables, raising up those who were overlooked.

Here's a man, refusing to be less than free, refusing to be less than utterly committed, refusing to bow down and serve the empires of the world; in tenderness, justice and joy, in forgiving and healing, he lived the promise of a new relationship with God. He was called by many names. He called himself 'the Son of Man'.

PRAYERS OF CONFESSION:

Risen Christ, even though we have before us the faithful witnesses of old, there are still times when we struggle to believe in your way, your truth and your life - moments when we doubt your resurrection and the hope it offers us.

Touch our lives with your grace.

Forgive our lack of faith and show us the way to truth and understanding.

We confess that sometimes you come to us in friend or stranger and we do not know you because we are determined to find you in some place or in someone of our own choosing.

We search through the tombs of our own life or cling together behind locked minds and we miss you standing before us.

Touch our lives with your discerning wisdom. Forgive our lack of discernment and show us the way to truth and understanding.

Sometimes our minds are locked into our own beliefs and dogmas and we turn away from those whose journey with you has differed from ours.

Touch our lives with compassion and respect for the beliefs of others. *Forgive our lack of tolerance and show us the way to truth and understanding.* Amen.

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THE SERVICE OF THE WORD.

EPISTLE READING: 1 Peter 1:3-9 NRSV

³ Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴ and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, ⁵ who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶ In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, ⁷ so that the genuineness of your faith—being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed. ⁸ Although you have not seen^[b] him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, ⁹ for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

GOSPEL READING: John 20:19-31

Jesus Appears to the Disciples

¹⁹ When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' ²⁰ After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when

they saw the Lord. ²¹ Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' ²² When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³ If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.'

Jesus and Thomas

²⁴ But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵ So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.'

²⁶ A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' ²⁷ Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe.' ²⁸ Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!' ²⁹ Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.'

³⁰ Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹ But these are written so that you may come to believe^[b] that Jesus is the Messiah,^[c] the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

YOUNG AT HEART:

Most grown-ups have lots of ways of proving who we are – things like driver's licences, credit cards, passports and they usually have our photographs on them. We need them to be allowed to drive a car, ride on the train for a cheaper fare, open a bank account, borrow books from the library, travel overseas – all sorts of things. If I show mine, people know it is me from my picture on the card. They know I am telling the truth when I say I am Julie Ross.

It was a bit like that with Jesus.

After Jesus had died on the cross, his disciples were very scared. They locked themselves in a small room because they were afraid the leaders would send soldiers to arrest them too.

On the Sunday after Jesus had come alive again, they were hiding in this room when suddenly, Jesus appeared to them! He said, "Peace be with you". They thought he was a ghost. One of the disciples Thomas was not with them. When they told him that they had seen Jesus and that he was alive, Thomas said, "I won't believe it until I see it with my own eyes." He said he wanted to see the nail-prints in Jesus' hands and the place where the spear was thrust in his side. Thomas wanted proof that this really was Jesus that they had seen.

A week later, Thomas saw Jesus in the same room. Jesus invited Thomas to touch his hands where the nails had been and his side where the spear had pierced. Then Thomas believed!

The disciples all cheered! They were very, very happy to see Jesus again.

A lot of people today won't believe that Jesus really rose from the grave and came back to life again because they haven't seen him with their own two eyes. They want "proof of identity" just like the people who want to see my identity cards.

But Jesus said, "Blessed are they who believe in me, even though they have not seen me". Blessed means "happy" and when we follow Jesus and believe in his love that is where we will find true happiness. And what is really important is to know that one of the ways we can **see** Jesus' love is when we see people in this church help other people who are sick or in trouble. And we see Jesus' love when we welcome everyone who comes to this church. We see Jesus' love in the people here who teach you about Jesus. And you can show people Jesus' love by being kind, helping people and loving everyone just like Jesus does.
