Readings

1 John 1:1-2:2

1 We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life—² this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us—³ what we have seen and heard we also declare to you so that you also may have fellowship with us, and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. ⁴ We are writing these things so that our^[a] joy may be complete.

God Is Light

⁵ This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. ⁶ If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; ⁷ but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. ⁸ If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. ⁹ If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. ¹⁰ If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.

The Commissioning of the disciples

²¹ Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²² When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³ If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

Thomas

²⁴ But Thomas (who was called the Twin^[a]), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵ So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

²⁶ A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷ Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸ Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!"

²⁹ Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

³⁰ Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. ³¹ But these are written so that you may continue [b] to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, [c] the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Did you grow up during a time when you were told it was wrong to doubt?


Were you discouraged from asking questions about your faith?

I remember going to church as a child with my grandmother and having to wear a hat, sit still, stay silent and not turn around to look at people behind me. I'm sure you may have had similar memories.

At Sunday school I was taught doubting Thomas should not have insisted on seeing, hearing, and touching Jesus, before he believed. Yet, it is Thomas who declares John's Christology: *My Lord and my God!*

John's first letter is addressed to the church in Turkey. He speaks highly of disciples who were witnesses and had seen, heard, and touched Jesus. Because of their witness all of us can believe in the risen Jesus. Perhaps Thomas was one of these witnesses.

Thomas insisted on seeing, hearing, and touching Jesus. He wanted to be sure he had risen, just as the other disciples had said. He had to find out for himself.



Perhaps Jesus rebuked Thomas for doubting. Jesus says: *Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.*

What do we do with our doubts?

Perhaps doubts are the building blocks of our faith and when we doubt and question, we find out more so we can discover and discern where our faith suits within us. Perhaps doubts and questions deepen our faith.

Testing things and finding out what connects with us, helps us explore our faith. It helps us make sense of it, own it, and make it ours. Just like Thomas did.



I remember studying theology as a lay leader at United Faculty at the time when members of the Uniting, Anglican and Catholic churches taught and were students, where over 250 students studied alongside candidates.

John Honnor was a Jesuit and physicist teaching Introduction to Christology. One day there were around a hundred students in the lecture theatre, and he invited us to ask any question we wanted. At first everyone was shocked and silent. There was so much energy in the theatre and it was almost like we could hear people's minds ticking over. Can I ask that question? The one I've saved up all my life.

Then everyone asked questions and John answered some but didn't promise to answer all. I had a question I'd saved up since I was a kid, and was wondering: Can I ask that one? I was almost bursting. Then like everyone else I asked the question. It felt so good! I've never forgotten the energy in that lecture theatre on that day.

The bible evokes so many questions. It takes a lifetime to understand only a fraction of the fundamental myths, mystical experiences, God moments, poetry, history, stories and parables, eyewitness accounts and personal experiences. The bible's richness offers insights to the diversity of people on this planet. We may read something today and not understand, then read it tomorrow and understand perfectly.

The word, the logos, the inspired word, the word is like a two-edged sword that penetrates to the very marrow of our being. In today's readings Jesus is the living word, the divine logos. The Word of life.

Doubting helps us to look deeper in order to understand these mysteries. Asking questions is part of a long process of looking below the surface of things where we grow in our faith and come to believe.

I wonder if doubting helps us walk in the light and find Jesus in the light and have fellowship with one another. God is light and now comes in Jesus as light. Light may symbolise these revelations from God and coming to understand them.

The good news for today is the disciples didn't need to have all the answers or an established faith for Jesus to commission them for the ministry of forgiveness. Jesus breathed the Holy Spirit upon them, and they received the Spirit. That alone was enough to empower them for ministry.
