Acts 1:1-11

1 In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and teach ² until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. ³ After his suffering^[a] he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. ⁴ While staying^[b] with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem but to wait there for the promise of the Father. "This," he said, "is what you have heard from me; ⁵ for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with^[c] the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

⁶So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

⁹When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

⁴⁴ Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." ⁴⁵ Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶ and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah^[a] is^[b] to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day ⁴⁷ and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem.

⁴⁸ You are witnesses^[C] of these things. ⁴⁹ And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised, so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

Reflection – Rev Tina

In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, amen.

I believe God has a sense of humour.

We have this story of the disciples.

They've seen Jesus rise up into the clouds and they're standing there pondering about the meaning of what they've just seen.

Suddenly two men in white robes come and stand by them and ask them: Why do you stand there looking up into heaven?

It's a good question.

Many of us have profound experiences and need to spend time trying to make sense of them. Perhaps what these two men in white robes are saying is, time to get on with it.

They've been told by Jesus to wait for the promised Holy Spirit in Jerusalem. So off they go to Jerusalem.

The first thing they do is pray and worship God in the temple and rejoice, as they wait on the Holy Spirit.

This is the foundation of their ministry.

Prayer, worship, rejoicing and being empowered by the Holy Spirit. Then they put their faith into action in practical ways.

My granny used to say: We use what we've got and get on with it.

All of us are gifted and called to minister and this involves being a volunteer.

Being a volunteer is about freely offering to do something. Every one of us contributes to the big picture and all of our contributions make up a ministry that changes people's lives for the better.

We become volunteers in all kinds of places because we care.

I'm a volunteer with VCC as an emergency chaplain and have been on duty after the two Bourke Street incidents where dozens of traumatised people sought comfort and to be listened to or have someone stand with them as they looked at all the flowers and teddies and remembered their experiences, both recent and in the past. Being a volunteer means being willing to reach out to others. It involves a risk. We come as we are and accept others with open hearts and hands.

The beautiful prayer from Ephesians calls on God to open the eyes of our hearts so we may know the hope which God has called us to and we discover this when we volunteer and give of ourselves to others, our time, our care and compassion and our gifts.

Look how people are blessed within our community and the wider community around us who come to the Op Shop, Centre 81, LinC, Kids Hope, and our church and experience being valued, cared for, listened to, and where they find God's light and love in us.

Pastoral Care tips – Rev Tina

Have you ever been unable to sleep?

No matter what you do it just doesn't happen.

You may be worried about something and your worries go around in circles in your mind and there's no stopping them or you made the mistake of having a coffee too late in the afternoon and you're wide awake or you were still sitting at the computer after 10:30 pm and it's mucked up your sleep patterns or you watched TV too late at night and ended up overtired and now, you just can't sleep.

Sounds familiar?

I've also heard from many people who say as they age, they struggle to sleep for more than five or six hours. There's only one problem with this lack of sleep is the feeling of jet lag the next day. You're not your usual self.

So, what's the cure for sleeplessness? I can only speak from personal experience. I get up, have a cup of sleepy time tea, or pray if I'm worried which breaks the patterns of worry, or watch my favourite TV or listen to the App Calm or read a book. Sooner or later I'm tired and usually fall into a deep sleep again. You may have your own way of overcoming sleeplessness. I guess what I'm saying is fighting against it and stressing over it isn't helpful. Going with it and accepting it, is easier.

I found this cartoon by Leunig. The term *dark night of the soul* has referred to spiritual dryness and experiencing the absence of God. It can also be experiencing a difficult and painful period in one's life such as journeying through the treatment for cancer or the breakdown of a relationship. Often sleep is the best cure but emotional pain makes sleep difficult.

Long hot baths, massages, counselling, and support if needed, walks outdoors or a visit to a hot spring or a kind friend who brings a hamper or makes a cuppa and listens, may help.

Leunig's cartoon speaks of struggle and hope. Perhaps the two go together.

The dark night of the soul is about the absence of God. Leunig's duck represents God. It seems like he is surrounded by God with four little ducks. Perhaps when we struggle, we experience hope and despair, Comfort and pain, fear, and love.
