Welcome, Call to worship and Acknowledgement of Country

As we gather today on the first Sunday of Lent, we take up last week's theme and are invited to take time to listen and notice God's Spirit in, around and working. We remember that Lent is a time of reflection and consideration rather than a time of going without. The disciplines of Lent are about making time and providing energy to refocus on God and notice.

Our First Nations people know in their heart, their stories and their understanding of life that all things are connected. What we do affects others and the wider creation. We acknowledge their wisdom and custodianship of God's creation. Lent invites us to join with our First Nations peoples to listen to creation, the land on which we meet and the creator of all. On this journey we commit to working together towards reconciliation and healing.

Reading: Genesis 9: 8 – 17

⁸ Then God said to Noah and to his sons with him, ⁹ "As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you ¹⁰ and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark.^{[a] 11} I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth." ¹² God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: ¹³ I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. ¹⁴ When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, ¹⁵ I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh, and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. ¹⁶ When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth." ¹⁷ God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth."

A reflection on Mark 1:9 – 15 by Rev Peter

Leading up to St Valentine's Day, the media seek out couples who have been together for a long time and ask them what is the secret of a long, happy relationship. If you asked a dozen couples, I'm sure you would get just as many different answers.

Last week, we noted that to build strong, resilient relationships, we need to make space for the other, listen, notice and learn about them. In doing so, we grow closer together and establish a deep intimacy.

This is as true in our relationship with God as it is with one another. God invites us close to Godself. Last week we were let into an intimate insight with the disciples, Peter, James and John. We heard of God's affirmation of Jesus, the same affirmation we read about in today's reading.

In today's reading from Mark though, only Jesus hears the affirmation and sees the dove of the Spirit descending. We as readers are welcomed into that space with Jesus, to share in that intimate blessing.

As with last week, there is a corresponding invitation or commissioning. Last week on the Mount of Transfiguration, the disciples in hearing God's affirmation were told to then listen to Jesus. Such listening conveys not just hearing the words but responding positively to the message. To listen is to act accordingly.

In this week's reading, Jesus is sent immediately into the wilderness, to pray, trust in God and prepare for his coming ministry and mission. We as readers are invited to journey with him into that space, alongside of the wild animals, trusting in God's Spirit and facing the tests and temptations that come our way. We are then called into ministry and service to those we meet.

This is the invitation of Lent. It is to take time to come close to God, seeking to participate in the mission and ministry of God in all aspects of our living. Jesus' baptism was just the beginning for him, just as ours has been for us.

Jesus proceeded to share good news, help those who were struggling and worked to set free the oppressed. This too is our mission. We too have something good to share with others. We too have a relationship with God and God's people that grounds us and frees us to be a blessing to each other. In this community, we too have been blessed with a hope that takes us beyond the struggles of the moment.
