Reading – Matthew 4:1-11 (NRSVue)

4 Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tested by the devil. ² He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterward he was famished. ³ The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." ⁴ But he answered, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.'"

⁵ Then the devil took him to the holy city and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, ⁶ saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down, for it is written, 'He will command his angels concerning you,' and 'On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone.'" ⁷ Jesus said to him, "Again it is written, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'"

⁸ Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory, ⁹ and he said to him, "All these I will give you, if you will fall down and worship me." ¹⁰ Then Jesus said to him, "Away with you, Satan! for it is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him.' " ¹¹ Then the devil left him, and suddenly angels came and waited on him.



Sermon

In the name of the Father the Son, and the Holy Spirit, amen.

Today's gospel tells us the Spirit led Jesus into the wilderness after his baptism where he was tempted by the devil. He had fasted for 40 days and nights and was famished. That's when the devil came to tempt him, to make bread from rocks.

Jesus must have been feeling weary and vulnerable and that's when the devil comes. Jesus responded by quoting scripture, we live by the word of God, not just bread. Perhaps some of us are tempted when we are weary and unwell. We may feel vulnerable and embrace negative thinking that goes around and around in our mind until we risk becoming a negative person. We often embody our negative thinking and feelings and become entrapped in them. Perhaps that's a good time to turn to God's words and find spiritual food to sustain us and help us become more positive.

Perhaps the words of God can cure negativity or anger or forms of thinking and feeling that make us vulnerable to temptations.

After this the first temptation the devil took Jesus to the top of the temple, to the pinnacle of God's Holy Place and tempted him and tried to plant seeds of doubt. Jesus just learnt God is his father and been called beloved by God.

The devil tempts Jesus to put God to the test and throw himself down so God would save him. The devil strikes at Jesus' love for God and his trust in God and in God's faithfulness to him as his beloved son. Jesus is not tempted. He knows God loves him and cares for him. He doesn't need to prove this to himself. He has no doubts in God's love. Perhaps the devil is trying to tempt him away from his call where he will not be saved by God from the cross.

Perhaps we are tempted to do things that force God to show love to us when we say to God, 'if you do this I will believe.' Or 'if this happens, I will believe.' when God is there for us, no matter what. We need only pray and listen to the still small voice of the Spirit in our hearts and believe what Jesus taught us, 'My sheep hear my voice and follow me.' We need to believe God loves us, no matter what. It's not about God doing things for us.

So, what did Jesus do? He quoted scripture. "Do not put the Lord God to the test".

I wonder if this would work for us when we feel tempted to doubt God's love for us. We keep on reading scripture until we feel convinced God loves us.

Now the devil knew Jesus had God's authority and power. Yet the devil offered to give Jesus all the kingdoms of the world. There is some irony in this, for Jesus said before he was crucified: "My kingdom is not of this world". Why tempt him? God's kingdom is greater than all worldly kingdoms. Any attempt by a human being to exercise power over worldly kingdoms is fleeting, as is their life. God's power is greater than any other form of power. What is going on here?

The price was to worship the devil. That means rejecting God and Jesus leaving his path. That's the nature of evil, to take us off our path. There are many temptations that can consume us and take us off our path.

So, what does Jesus do? He says: "Away with you." He commands the devil to leave him. Then he quoted scripture. 'Worship the Lord your God and serve only God.' Jesus remained faithful to God, to his call and he stayed on his path and the devil gave up and left him.

I wonder what the best strategy is when we are tempted to leave our path and embrace behaviour that takes us far away from God. Would turning to scripture be the cure or a popcorn prayer like "Lord" or remembering who we are or what kind of legacy we want to leave.

Often when we face an illness, grief, rejection, or disappointment or being hurt by another, we are tempted to give up, feel despair, defeated, or afraid. We can feel like we are in a dark cave when all we have to do is turn around and there is the light at the end of the tunnel that leads to life.

If we can find a way to resist temptations like Jesus did, we will stay on our path. No matter how bad things get, continuing to worship God and serve God is the cure. Living our faith, putting it into practice is the cure for temptations. If we can stay focused on God, our faith will see us through.

God will send people to us who are like angels, and they will care for us, comfort us, and bring God's message to us that we are loved.

Today's gospel invites us to hold fast to God's word, trust God loves us and worship and serve God. Then we can weather any storm, challenge, or temptation, like Jesus did.
