### **REFLECTION:** Rev Peter

Instead of a traditional sermon or reflection, I would like to invite you to journey with me in a Lectio Divina. We invite you to listen for the ways God might be speaking to you through your senses and imagination. If you are unfamiliar with meditation or feel a bit uncertain about it, I will help guide throughout.



#### **Meditation Instructions:**

- 1) Focus on your breath. If your mind begins to wander, inhale and exhale slowly. Stay mindful of your breathing as a way to bring you back into the present moment.
- 2) When you listen to the scripture reading, hold onto a word or phrase that resonates with you. Consider repeating this word or phrase as a mantra in your head to help you stay focused.
- 3) If you find yourself not knowing what to think, or trying to figure out what the reading means, remember that you are invited to simply be an observer. As you read and reflect, note simple observations about what you read, or ask yourself questions such as, "Why did the writer tell the story with that detail?" or "Why did the writer tell the story in this way?" or "How does this story make me feel?" Perhaps your questions will lead to more questions and more observations and then you'll be getting somewhere.

Centre yourself by taking a deep breath and relaxing your body as best you can. Allow your shoulders to lower away from your ears. Let your arms rest in your lap and let your feet be fully supported by the floor. Feel the weight of your body held by the chair. Spend this time in quiet. Open yourself up to God's voice. (pause) (1-2 min)

Now, for those at worship, let us listen to the reading. For those at home, read the reading. Listen for a word or image that comes to mind.

READ OUR PASSAGE OUT LOUD: John 12:20 – 33 Maeve Martinus

#### Read first time

<sup>20</sup> Some Greeks who had come to Jerusalem for the Passover celebration <sup>21</sup> paid a visit to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee. They said, "Sir, we want to meet Jesus." <sup>22</sup> Philip told Andrew about it, and they went together to ask Jesus.

<sup>23</sup> Jesus replied, "Now the time has come for the Son of Man<sup>[a]</sup> to enter into his glory. <sup>24</sup> I tell you the truth, unless a kernel of wheat is planted in the soil and dies, it remains alone. But its death will produce many new kernels—a plentiful harvest of new lives. <sup>25</sup> Those who love their life in this world will lose it. Those who care nothing for their life in this world will keep it for eternity. <sup>26</sup> Anyone who wants to serve me must follow me, because my servants must be where I am. And the Father will honour anyone who serves me.

<sup>27</sup> "Now my soul is deeply troubled. Should I pray, 'Father, save me from this hour'? But this is the very reason I came! <sup>28</sup> Father, bring glory to your name."

Now listen deeper. What words or phrases are you most drawn to? What parts of the story did you quickly brush by or overlook? (pause) (1-2 min)

#### Read third time

And now, use your imagination. **Imagine yourself in this piece. Where would you be and how would you interact with what surrounds you?** Take your time. **(1-2 min)**
