Recently in the **Forest Hill Op shop** a wonderful gesture of kindness was seen. Although not the first time such things have been witnessed, this moved those who heard to tears. A lady wandering around the shop collecting several things she wished to purchase and brought them to the desk. They amounted to \$14, however she then asked whether we took credit, and when told that we cannot at the moment, she tried to work out how to pay, as she didn't carry cash. The assistant agreed to take her name, and put the goods aside until she could return with the money.

A very scruffy, unshaven, poorly dressed, not so clean looking man came to the desk, holding out a \$20 note. He had heard the conversation, and offered to pay. The lady was stunned, and said she couldn't possibly accept, but he insisted, and again she said "No, thank you!" He repeated his offer, and the lady said she would bring the cash to his home, to which he replied that he lived in St. Kilda and it was too far, then he stated "I have lung cancer, and I really want to do something good for someone!" There was no choice but to accept the money as it meant so much to him. Everyone was overwhelmed by his action, and as he quietly left the lady wondered how on earth she could thank him, and it was suggested that she simply pass the kindness onto another person.

The Op shop always welcomes new volunteers to help in this wonderful outreach which is valuable for those who work there, those who buy goods and to the many groups and organizations who receive the funds donated.

NEWS FROM THE WHITEHORSE CHURCH COUNCIL.

The following are the main points from the February meeting and some later news.

- 1. A Retreat/Training session on the Code of Conduct for Lay leaders is planned for March 25th, with Mel Perkins, Lay Leadership Development Co ordinator.
- 2. The position of Administrative Assistant is being advertised widely, but no applications received to date.
- 3. A meeting with Phil McCredden from Ecclesia will be held to discuss a possible proposal for the next stage of our Shared Future. It is envisioned that a Planning Day, including the whole congregation will be held soon. We would consider our identity as a congregation, where we see our congregation in the future, along with our mission and purpose.
- 4. Membership Rolls of the three former congregations will be merged. The total membership number will determine the number of representatives Whitehorse will have at Presbytery.
- 5. Pastoral Care—co ordinators for each location and Rev. Tina will meet to form a Pastoral Care Ministry group. Barbara Wandoch has taken the role of co ordinator at Nunawading, following the retirement of Cherril Randles and John Baker.
- 6. Lent. Rev. Tina will lead an Ash Wednesday evening service; Rev. Julie Ross will lead the mid week service; Lenten studies will be held on Sundays at 4.00pm at Forest Hill.
- 7. Supply Minister, while Rev. Peter Cannon is on Sick leave. Occasional supply by Rev. Julie Ross was approved.

She will assist in February, and be available in April.

- 8. Worship services in March will continue with rotation of Together at 10 services across the three locations. It was felt that these services had encouraged congregation interaction. The leadership skills shown in lay led worship was seen as positive.
- 9. All Ministry groups have not met yet and membership of groups is being sought. The Mission and Justice group was formed from representatives of each former congregation and has been working together since before amalgamation. A planning day was held on February 28th.
- 10. The Treasurer is bringing together the three reporting systems under one system. A Whitehorse bank a/c is not able to be openwd because all Tax Office information is not yet available. Loose change offerings in February and March will go to the Turkiye/Syria Relief Appeal.

Following the resignation of Michael Plumridge in February Lynne Rosenthal has agreed to become a Council member. Her membership will be accepted at the March meeting.

The CC is grateful to Jacinta Selvaratnam, who acts as Minute Secretary for each meeting.

The next meeting will be held on March 8th.

In your sacred name, I pray. Amen.

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

In a heap of old church magazines I found a programme for the Melbourne Engine club's 17th Steam and Vintage Engine club, from 1985! We don't know where it came from, and it was years prior to Niel's interest in engines, and even they are different and smaller than these.

Derek Moore from Mitcham was the group secretary and an exhibitor of a Marshall Portable steam engine, the cylinder of which was build in 1908, first registered in 1948, last steamed 1950, prior to its 1978 restoration. It was used for many years to steam eucalyptus leaves for extraction and manufactor of eucalyptus oil. He also exhibited a Fowler Steam Traction engine, built in 1903,



and used in Shepparton between the two world wars for





The group held a planning day on February 28th,

leading the group to some concrete action plans to meet our M and J goals for 2023.

We looked at this under three main areas. We want our Church Community to

- *be aware of
- *to become involved in
- *to take action on with us in 2023.

A Mission ladder was used to acknowledge that we cannot do everything we might like to do. The three established programs in the A space are—Centre 81, Kids Hope, and Op Shop. By the end of the day two more were added in the B space—Homeless /Disadvantaged and Environment Climate. The three A programmes already do much in the B space.

Small groups also workshopped and brainstormed ideas to implement our agreed priorities for 2023 in line with our agreed M &J strategies.

These are

*Education and Advocacy (what? How?) Some ideas being regular announcements, information, on current active ties, in Sunday services, (including online) and newsletters.

*using expertise from congregational members.

- *traiing for volunteers (Centre 81, Womaen's Refuge.
- *letter writing-ensure all members are aware of issues and letters are available for signing.
 - *building relationships with state and federal politicians and local government councilors to discuss concerns and issues particularly related to our programme.

Donations (in support of what?how?when?)

- *Open plate- with visibility in power point, newsletters and announcements. Of time-work in Centre 81 and Op shop in promoting issues, become a Kids Hope mentor.
- *filling jars with \$1 ir \$2 coins.
- *collection/donations of non perishable food, or money to Centre 81 food bank and Uniting East burwood each Sunday.

Programs(addressing what is needed. Demonstrating Justice for? Partnering with others?)

*develop a coffee space/shop near Op shop and maybe Centre 81 tp provide opportunity to connect with local community.

*targeted fund raising for a current cause. Eg. floods.

These are just a snap shot of some of the discussons and ideas put forward from the groups.

At each monthly meeting the discussion will con tinue and future strategies firmed

The final component of the day was looking at how re relate, interact and respond within the broader church. These included the Church Council, Ministry team, UVCT, Whitehorse Churches Care and our own congregation.

We are hoping to develop a calendar displayed at each church to take into account Social Justice dates and other commitments we may have.

I wonder how present day workers would feel if at the end of the week they were handed a bag of salt for their labours. Not so pleased, I imagine! Yet, the soldiers of the Roman legions were paid partly in salt and the word 'salary' comes from 'salarium' meaning 'soldier's salt money.' Wars have been fought over salt. One of the reasons the Romans came to Britain was that they had been told the country was rich in salt. Some of the first known roads were built to transport salt, and bars of salt were once used as currency in Ethiopia. Yes, salt is one of the comonest, but most important minerals in the world. This gem was found in a 1996 issue of a Nunawading UC magazine, and printed due to Tina's using

"Salt and Light" as her Lenten theme.



REVIEWS OF "THE RED DOG"

All who attended the first film and study appeared to enjoy this lovely film, highlighting the arrival of a stray dog at the Hammers-ley Mining community in the 1970s.

We saw Red Dog befriend a couple of lonely miners on his own terms before the arrival of John, who drove the buses transporting miners between their accommodation and the mine.

Red Dog adopts John, and John adopts Red Dog.

John falls in love with Nancy, and Red Dog accepts her too, as do all the miners.

We see several instances of a wonderful community spirit between the characters and each other in everyday circumstances, particularly in times of need. We also see instance of both the humans and Red Dog going beyond the call of duty in their responses.

At times the film is humorous, and at other times very sad, as in real life, giving rise to a comparison with Jesus' example to his followers, and in turn passing down to us as Christians today. We spent time considering our responses in comparison to the community, and also to the complete, unwavering faithfulness of Red Dog.

This film and ensuing study relating to it sent many of us home with food for thought for the following week, so thank you Tina, study leaders, and all who attended found this time worthwhile.

'There is a statue on the outskirts of the Pilbarra town of Dampier in the north of WA. This is Red Dog, an adventurer who relied on friendly care as he wandered far and wide. He had belonged to bus driver, John, and travelled with him around the area and as far south as Perth. Then, after John's death he continued to travel alone affectionately assisted by many in the area.

Several books have been written about him, one of which was adapted for this film which filled in a background of the time in an isolated outback mining area—wild, dry and redder than the dog, male dominated, often lonely.

We saw how important developing community was, to provide release in social activities and to provide support in times of grief or hardship. We compared this with the usual, fly in, fly out miners of today, with difficulties for both individuals and the townships in which they temporarily reside, always remaining outsiders. The attitudes shown in the film, macho and sexist, hopefully have changed today (or they are less openly expressed?)

We also saw the importance of the padre when John's funeral somberly brought the town, even Red Dog together. Could this have been a bush chaplain from our UC Frontier Services? It is surely a valued role in such communities, especially when tragedy befalls. We left with the understanding that developing community takes everyone's input, each with their gifts and talents, surely a message as we come together as one congregation.

FROM REV. TINA

This week twenty one of us gathered for our second week of the Lenten studies to watch the movie "The Help" For those of us who share a passion for Justice, the movie proved to be heartfelt, challenging and it stirred our emotions.

It is based on a true story about the deep south of the USA during the 1960s, where


most maids were treated in a shabby, unjust way in a system that allowed whites to have more power. That is until Skeeter, a young white woman and budding journalist arrives back home after four years at college. Initially she sought a story from Aibileen, one of the maids, but this changed when her publisher put pressure on her to gain more stories and two maids, Aibeleen and Milly teamed up to write their stories, their way. A series of injustices and moments in history encourages other maids in the area to write a book about their stories. Skeeter, her mother, Aibeleen and Milly's lives were changed by the power of the womens' stories and courage to share them and the woman's book led to an unjust being changed.

The women who were the 'help' were portrayed as women of deep faith, and the women who mistreated them as shallow, where at some stage Aiblileen, who had grown in courage calls Hilly, the main protagonist godless, and challenges her to rethink her life.

The movie's message is that there comes a time for all of us, when we have to choose to speak out against unjust behavior and systems, and not only speak out, but act. Staying silent promotes suffering and hardship for those who are oppressed.

Stand me upright on a foundation of faith while I take the next steps. Build my voice as an instrument for defending freedoms which provide equality. Keep my motivations clean.

Grant me the tools to see near and far, and find me adjusting the lens often.

Help me to give a leg up to the underdog: to root for the one who doesn't stand a chance. Help me to accept being unliked and misunderstood for positioning myself behind what I believe in.

Bolster my confidence and give me the understanding and empathy required for maintaining existence. Make tolerance my priority and give me the words and actions to fight violence with the sword of peace.

Orient me to inclusivity. Help me to stop putting individuals into dualistic opposition, rather focus me on repairing broken systems, and my participation in them. Dissolve my tendencies for cliques, partisanship, judgement, righteousness, bandwagons and the damning or idolizing of those I perceive to have more than me.

Help me to do my part to clang the bells of freedom. When ten thousand are whispering, make me one who is listening.




