I invite you to look at the carving and reflect on your lifelong relationships and on what has kept you together. Give thanks to God and pray for your loved one.

This is not a time to be alone. It's a time to reach out to one another and work hard to nurture our relationships. Imagine how much more of a challenge it is with friends on the other side of the country or world or even more than five kilometres away. Hurry and bring my father down here." 45:14 Then he fell upon his brother Benjamin's neck and wept, while Benjamin wept upon his neck. 45:15 And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.


Psalm 133

God's Dream

This is a copy of the front cover of Desmond Tutu's children's book: *God's Dream* It encourages people to live together in peace. This is an extract:

Do you know what God dreams of? Close your eyes and look with your heart, dear child...

God dreams about people sharing. God dreams about people caring.

God dreams that we reach out and hold one another's hands and play one another's games and laugh with one another's hearts. But God does not force us to be friends or to love one another.

Dear Child of God, it does happen that we get angry and hurt one another. Then we feel sad and very alone. Sometimes we cry, and God cries with us.

But when we say we're sorry and forgive one another, we wipe away our tears and God's tears too.

Each of us carries a piece of God's heart within us.

And when we love one another, the pieces of God's heart are made whole.

God dreams that every one of us will see that we are all brothers and sisters – yes, even you and me – even if we have different mummies and daddies or live in faraway lands...

Even if we speak different languages or have different ways of talking to God. Even if we have different eyes or different skin... Even if you are taller and I am smaller... Even if your nose is little and mine is large...

Dear child of God, do you know how to make God's dream come true? It is really quite easy.

As easy as sharing, loving, caring. As easy as holding, playing, laughing. As easy as knowing we are one big family because we are all God's children. Will you help God's dream come true?

Let me tell you a secret... God smiles like a rainbow when you do.

Sermon – Reach Out

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen.

These are challenging times. A time to pray for others and seek unity. A time when many of us are going stir crazy and some of us aren't coping. There is a need to be patient with one another, especially with family. Its' not easy being cooped up and allowed out for exercise, one hour a day, with only one person allowed per household allowed out to shop, all within five Kilometres from home. Each of us is doing our best to find a way of coping and a daily routine, with purpose. This time will become part of our story, but it's not the whole story. We will come through this, if we stick together and care for one another.

Our stories are powerful, where yesterday influences today and the future. Our story is part of who we are. For some, things may have come to a head today, after a series of pressures, disappointments, losses, and it may trigger an inner crisis that sends ripples out, like what happens when you drop a stone into a calm lake, ripples that influence a network of relationships. If this is happening to you, reach out for help.

You're not alone.

For all of us, our stories are contained within a larger story, that of our faith journey with God and others. It is the story we live within that speaks into our story. We live within a larger story, of faiths, our nations, our history and our world's. it's a story that hasn't got a beginning or an end. Our story joins the stories of others who have struggled like us and overcome and lived on to embrace new life.

And it's not a perfect story. Today's gospel speaks of imperfections, failures, betrayal and how things can go terribly wrong in relationships. Jesus makes the point that whatever we say can hurt others, for example, words of exclusion, prejudice, harsh words, then he demonstrates how in front of his disciples. He ignores a suffering woman, because she is not Jewish. He insults her. But her feisty comeback must have surprised the disciples, for women weren't valued and didn't have a voice. Matthew's community heard this story and they were largely Jewish. Jesus isn't just their Messiah. He has come for all. Jesus affirms the woman's faith and holds her out as an example of someone with faith and her daughter is healed. She pushed through all the obstacles she faced, and her determination came from love for her daughter. Her faith was patient and understanding and she saw though people's imperfections and overcame cultural and religious barriers, overcome prejudice and power, overcame being insulted, demeaned, excluded, cast aside and ignored. Her story touches the lives of anyone who has suffered being rejected, excluded, ignored, insulted, judged, cast aside and who has been made to feel bad about themselves because they are not perfect. Her faith was great, and Jesus knew this and loved her, just like he loves all of us. All who came to him do not need to fit in, be perfect, be nice, or acceptable. It's Jesus love and acceptance of us that changes our lives and our stories. Our faith exists in all the messiness of life. All we need to do is reach out to Jesus and keep on reaching out. That's the good news of today's gospel.

> A poet named Kahlil Gibran wrote about tears, saying: Love that is cleansed by tears will remain eternally pure and beautiful.

The story about Joseph is about a man who didn't avoid the pain caused by his brothers, who broke his heart when they planned on killing him, then sold him into slavery as a young boy. They were envious of their father's love for him and thought Joseph arrogant for sharing a dream he had with them that had him ruling over them as a great leader. Through jealously they broke their fathers' heart. Then Joseph experienced betrayal from his master's wife and imprisonment, until he gained a reputation for interpreting dreams. Pharaoh heard about his gift and asked him to interpret his dream. Joseph told him the dream spoke of seven years of good crops followed by seven years of famine. Pharaoh made him governor over all of Egypt, a powerful and important ruler who controlled who had access to grain. In the second year of the famine Joseph's father sent his brothers to buy grain, because their land was ravaged by famine.

At first Joseph tested them, as he wept and struggled with his feelings. His tears showed he was deeply moved by seeing them again. Perhaps the tears cleansed his heart.

Ken Gire wrote a book called: Windows of the Soul. There's a chapter in it called: Windows of Tears.

He quotes Frederick Buechner: Whenever you find tears in your eyes, especially unexpected tears, it well to pay the closest attention. They are not only telling you something about the secret of who you are, but more often God is speaking to you through them of the mystery of where you have come from and is summoning you to where, if your soul is to be saved, you should go next.

Perhaps this is what was happening for Joseph.


For Ken Gire, he thought of all the times he'd cried over the years. The time when he saw his father cry after a member of the team he coached died, the time his father died, the time he heard the song from the *Wizard of Oz: Over the Rainbow* sung, just after WW II began, and when he was pondering on the words of A.W. Tozer who wrote: *The bible was written in tears and to tears it yields its treasures.*

Tears when he visited a hospital to see a friend, tears when he watched the *Sound of Music* where the Von Trapp family sung *Edelweiss* and tears when a friend was dying of cancer. Tears when he woke up beside his wife of many years and realized she was a joy to him and remembered the wonderful memories they shared, the laughter, joy and love. We can relate to some of these memories and may have cried tears for many reasons over our lifetime. Tears of sadness, joy and laugher, grief and loss, disappointment and deep hurt. Tears that have cleansed our soul. Tears about grieving and forgiveness and tears when the Holy Spirit has moved our soul and tears listening to music.

For Joseph, perhaps his tears reveal his deep hurt or desire to reconcile with his brothers, or a mixture of both. He sent away everyone in his household but his brothers, so he could reveal himself to them. He wept so loudly everyone heard, even Pharaoh. His brothers were dismayed, and he reassured them. It seems as if he had risen above the heartbreak, they had caused him. Instead he saw God's will and purpose in what had happened to him, saying, 'God has sent me before you. God has made me a father to Pharaoh, Lord of his house, a ruler over Egypt. He has sent me here to save my family and my people. Joseph told them to tell his father about what has come of him and that his father can bring his people to Egypt to live close by in Gosher during the famine and he would make sure they were provided for. Then he embraced his brother Benjamin and they both wept, and he kissed his brothers and wept. His choice to reconcile and forgive was not an act of weakness. It took power and strength. It was an act of redemption, not only for his brothers, but for himself. It was like closure of the heartbreak he had experienced. He named his first son Manasseh, which meant God has made me forget all my hardship and all my father's house. However, when he saw his brothers he couldn't forget. To put aside his pain was a great step forward in his life for him. To offer someone redemption can be a moment of deep healing. To receive a gift from someone who has hurt you deeply is a moment of redemption. I know what it's like to make the choice offer redemption to someone on their death bed after they hurt me. To realise my life has been filed with God's blessings and love and is not defined by someone else's actions helped me rise above the pain and move on to embrace new life. I gave them a holding cross, which comforted them while they were dying, and they held it when they died. I consider that as the work of God in my soul, bringing grace and healing. It is not an easy choice to offer redemption, but the release, peace and healing that comes from offering it, is worth it, for both people. For Joseph and his brothers, redemption meant they were free to move on to embrace new beginnings and rebuild their relationships.

I've wept tears of joy when reunited with family. My mother-in-law wept when she came all the way to Australia and was reunited with my husband. We weep for many reasons. Sometimes we weep like Joseph when he was reunited with his brothers, with a friend we haven't seen for a long time, because of a misunderstanding. Other times we weep with people who have always loved us and cared for us where the thought of being separated brings tears or when we have been separated for a long time and finally, we are reunited.

There will be many tears when family are reunited after the present lockdown comes to an end and we are allowed to embrace one another. Pray for the families who are experiencing family breakdown at the moment, due to just too many pressures being placed on their fragile relationships. Tell your loved ones you love them. Reach out to them and give thanks for them. Make the choice, if you can, to reconcile with someone. Do not be too hard on yourself, if that's not possible or wise. Keep on reaching out to God and others. It's a way forward during this time of isolation. We are not alone.

The first photo is of a group of young people from four different faiths in dialogue about their faith and what it means for them. The second photo is of a Hindu priest, Buddhist monk (Theravadin) and a Christian minister having a conversation about their faith.

Some of the religions may have changed or developed since then, but we still live in a multicultural world, except that our world has become smaller and global. There is a real need for world peace and cooperation, if we are going to have a future.

For The Young At Heart – The Power Of Prayer



I have a book called *Creative ideas for Quiet Corners* by Lynn Chambers.

In it are a series of suggestions to create different arrangements on tables for worship.

This one is called *Praying for others* and these are the steps for creating it:

Step 1: Find some stones where each one represents the people in your life.

You may choose to put them in a bowl or basket

Step 2: Lay a piece of blue fabric on the table or kitchen bench and arrange it like waves

Step 3: Make a brown mat (with paper and paint) or use a cork placemat

Step 4: Find a ceramic bowl and fill it with water (the stones make a nice noise when you drop them into it)

Step 5: You may like to add photos of the sea, lakes, rivers or ponds or draw a small picture of them.

When you're ready, sit quietly in prayer, then take a pebble that represents you and place it on the brown mat.

Look at its texture and colour. Think about the people in your family and look at the basket of stones.

Choose a pebble that represents a family member and place it beside the pebble that represents you.

Keep doing this until you have chosen pebbles to represent your family. Think about others who are important to you and choose pebbles to represent them and place them on the mat.

Look at the pebbles on the mat and spend some time talking to God about the people the pebbles represent. When you are finished place them back into the basket. If there are others with you, they may choose to select pebbles in the same way, then return them to the basket.

When you're ready, choose a stone from the basket to represent your prayers and hold it in your hand as you think about the people who are important to you. Think about how this pebble was made, washed, smoothed, by water, then think about God washing over and shaping the lives of the people you are praying for.

When you are ready drop the pebble in the water and quietly thank God for listening and answering your prayers. If there are others with you, they may like to do the same. Pray for others who have joined you at the pebble pool. You are welcome to finish with this prayer.

Loving God, I bring to all the people and situations that these pebbles represent. I pray for all those who used these pebbles in their love and care for others. Amen

You may choose to keep a small pebble in a pocket or on the kitchen windowsill as a reminder to pray.

The Story Of A Pebble



One of the pebbles I used for my prayer table came from a church called Dominus Flevit (The Lord Wept). It was a piece of white quartz when I found it in a pool of water beside the church, which is built to look like a teardrop. The other picture is of the window I'm looking out of over Jerusalem. This is the place where Jesus realised Jerusalem would be destroyed one day (it was in 70 AD) and he wept for the people, for those who rejected his message.



I brought the pebble home with me. Years later when I was doing some chaplaincy training at a hospital, I got to know a patient and his wife. They had left their country, business, family, friends, to come to Australia

for treatment. The husband had throat cancer and all treatment had failed. When he realised nothing was going to work and he was dying he had a meltdown. Was angry. Next day I returned with the pebble and showed it to him. I told him I held it for weeks on end when I was grieving. I asked him, would he like to borrow it and hold it for as long as it took for him to grieve and return it when he'd finished with it. Weeks later he returned it and thanked me. It was stained yellow because his liver had failed and had crystalized, and the crystals looked like tiny tear drops. Next day he went home to die. Later on, a family member told me he had made his peace with God before he died.

A Story From Margaret Cosstick

Margaret remembers attending an in-service at school, when she was teaching, saying "and I've been retired since the end of 2007 ... after I'd turned 65!". However, this old lady still remembers part of this particular inservice very well. It was on health and well-being. The presenter talked about "The 3 A's". Maybe you already know about them, but just in case I'll explain (but the guy gave excellent examples and told a good story along the way). You handle a difficult situation or problem by applying the 3 A's in this order:

- 1. AVOID it if you can
- 2. ALTER it if you can
- 3. ACCEPT it if you can't avoid or alter.

My Mum and Dad lived in Brisbane and I used to ring them for a long chat once a week. At this stage Dad had died, so it was only Mum. I told her about the in-service and the 3A's. She really took them on board and when people came to visit her (as her mind was sharp, but physically she was not as strong by the end – at 94), and if they were upset about a problem, she shortened the 3A's to 2A's explaining if they couldn't <u>alter</u> the situation they had no choice but to <u>accept</u> it.

Footprints In The Sand

One night I dreamed a dream.

As I was walking along the beach with my Lord across the dark sky flashed scenes from my life.

For each scene, I noticed two sets of footprints in the sand, one belonging to me and one to my Lord.
