

From The Message – A Humorous Story

I've always liked this story...

Four lepers are sitting outside the city gate, a city that's under siege. They said to one another, "What are we doing sitting here at death's door? If we enter the famine-struck city, we'll die; if we stay here, we'll die. So, let's take our chances in the camp of Aram and throw ourselves on their mercy. If they receive us, we'll live, if they kill us, we'll die. We've got nothing to lose." So after the sun went down, they got up and went to the camp of Aram. It didn't take them long to realise the camp had been abandoned. At first, they panicked and ran, then they changed their mind and went to the camp and into the tents and ate and drank. Then they grabbed silver, gold, and clothing, and went off and hid it. They came back, entered another tent, and looted it, again hiding their plunder. Then they said to one another, 'do you think we should tell them, the people in the city?'

This is a story that's relevant at the moment, where so many people in the world are facing starvation and homelessness, even in western nations. If we want to get through this time, we need to share what we have with those who have nothing, those who are under siege from COVID-19 and starving.

Sermon

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen



Lorraine Grant's brother Alan from Benalla is the Volunteer Coordinator for Uniting Church volunteers with Blaze Aid, a volunteer-based organisation working with families and individuals in rural Australia after natural disasters such as fires and floods.

Recently when the COVID-19 restrictions were in place he was travelling along the freeway to Corryong, Victoria and suddenly realised he'd missed the turnoff to Corryong and had ended up in NSW. Someone stopped him to inform him he needed a permit.

No! No! Alan wasn't having a bar of that! He insisted on saying he'd missed the turnoff.

Alan had been doing this work for months and how he'd missed the turnoff was anybody's guess! A very helpful policeman arrived and said he'd sort out the problem. The result was Alan was told to go up there to the crossing between the freeways, turn on the truck's hazard lights and wait. Moments later the policeman drove up to Alan saying, 'Stick close behind me' and with the police car flashing lights on, off they went, back to Vic, with Alan free to continue fencing.

Paul said, 'Hold fast to the rule of love.' Love is everywhere. You only have to look around you. It's what knits us together. If we look back over our life and remember all the love we have received — we'd say, 'What a life!' And, why would this change for us? There is so much more love to give and receive, where giving is just as important as receiving love and those who reach out in love need their love affirmed, valued, and treasured and those who receive love grow in love.

This mutual love makes the world go around.

This photo, at right, is of a group of people from Templestowe Uniting (now part of Manningham churches).



They're standing in front of a cross on a hill at Pallotti College, Millgrove. My heart burned when I first went to Templestowe Uniting Church and worshipped with the congregation. I soon found out why.

Several people told me the story about one of their ministers who stayed for twenty years.

He was travelling to Templestowe Uniting to be inducted with his young daughter when he was involved in a car accident, where his daughter was uninjured, but he ended up a paraplegic.

The congregation wanted him to be their minister, so they changed around the entire worship space, by moving the Lord's Table from in front of a large floor to roof window, to the right side of the church were they placed it on a platform, with wheelchair ramps going up each side of the Table, and then they moved all the pews around into a semi-circle to face the table and recarpeted the inside of the church. The entrance was also changed. Members of the congregation said many times, 'He taught us how to love.' I heard many people speak about how he received so much love from the congregational members and gave so much in return.

It was a transformative love.

There are many ways of showing love, for example by being a peacemaker and I've included a YouTube of Susan Boyle singing: *Make Me A Channel Of Your Peace*. 1 Corinthians also speaks of many kinds of love, such as kindness and patience and I'm sure churches embody and reveal the many faces of love.

Today's gospel says church is where two or three are gathered together. I've included the song:

I Am The Church for the Young At Heart. A church is a gathering of people who embody and express God's love, who speak of the great love and faithfulness of God in their lives and of their love for God.

God's love is Trinitarian. The commandment of love is about loving God with all our being and others as ourselves. John wrote in his letter: If we have God in us, we have love in us and if we have love in us, we have God in us. Our great God loved us so much he sent Jesus to be amongst us, Jesus our Emmanuel. We are his brothers and sisters in Christ, his heart, voice, hands and feet in the world. Jesus loved us so much he lay down his life for us and taught us how to do the same by giving of ourselves, our resources and time, to one another.

We are the body of Christ, the love of Jesus in the world.

Jesus said, 'Where two or three are gathered together in my name I am there among them.' Some of us may be alone at the moment and may call on Jesus and he comes and suddenly there are two. We may phone up someone and pray with them and suddenly there are two, where Jesus is present. We may be two or three and call on the Lord, and suddenly there is

a small group gathered together with Jesus. The church comes in many sizes and is about the loving presence of Jesus with us.




Love is like a heart a woman made on the beach at Mount Martha, where she must have spent hours making it.

Perhaps she wanted to express the love in her heart or celebrate the love in her life.



The Holy Spirit moves us to express God's love, a love that's poured into our hearts, love that grows, transforms, blesses and moves us to act with love. Every morning we pray and put on the armour of Light, we put on Christ and become aware of how we are in Christ and Christ is in us. We come to know how the Spirit moves our hearts and moves us to reach out with love and how we dwell in this love.

Robert was intellectually challenged and loved by the congregation he belonged to and he loved them. Without fail, every Sunday he'd walk from his shared care home to church. He was always aware of people when they were suffering or those who needed prayer. When we had candle prayers, he'd light candles for all of them. A woman of prayer named Dorothy, a lifetime elder, spent her life praying for others and writing and saying prayers at meetings. She raised a family, was an artist and orchardist. After she died, we heard about her love for others. We even heard she'd been an elder in the aboriginal community and had a possum cloak. Children know of God's love and express it openly. Jubilee danced up the front of the church next to the Lord's table one day. Her eyes were closed, and her face looked peaceful and she danced. Perhaps those who watched would have considered her dance as her love for God embodied and felt drawn into that love. Let your hearts be free like a child's.



Look around you at others and how they express love, look at paintings, and listen to music or watch a movie.

Read your bible or devotional. Look at your pets and consider their unconditional love for you.

Count your blessings. Love is all round us.

Prayers Of The People And The Lord's Prayer

Heather Barnes has prepared the Prayers of the People for you today

Gracious and loving God, although we are unable to gather together, we come before you this morning to bring you our cares and concerns in the 'Prayers of the People'.

Today in the World Prayer Cycle we are remembering the African Republics of Ghana and Nigeria.

The first Europeans arrived in Ghana in the 15th Century and commenced a trade in slaves. During the Colonial period, cocoa was introduced and became the backbone of the economy. Independence was achieved in 1957 but political unrest has been a continuing problem, along with troubling health issues. The northern parts of the country are prone to drought while environmental problems include deforestation, over grazing and inadequate water supplies.

Nigeria was created by an amalgamation of several British Colonies in 1914. Since then many violent coups have occurred and the Republic has an extremely poor human rights record. Even with its rich oil resources, there is great inequality in the distribution of wealth and Nigeria remains one of the poorest countries in the world. Many areas struggle with the problems of urbanisation, such as overcrowding, crime, corruption, unemployment and housing shortages. Disease and malnutrition are common.

Dear Lord, we uphold the peoples of Ghana and Nigeria before you and pray for a more equal distribution of wealth and power, an end to human rights abuses and better health care for all.

Heavenly Father, your whole world is experiencing an unprecedented health emergency. We ask for your guiding hand for all the World Leaders, along with all those in Positions of Responsibility. May they lead and act wisely and fairly. Give us the grace dear Lord to play our part by being kind, considerate and co-operative.

In the *Ecumenical Prayer Cycle* this morning we are remembering the Priest and congregation of our neighbourhood Catholic Church of St. John's. Be with them all as they seek to serve the Mitcham Community in your name.

In the *UCA*, our prayers are with the Lilydale-Montrose congregation and also with the Chaplaincy ministry at The Lord Smith Animal Hospital.

May your love shine through the words and actions of your people in these communities.

Here at Mountview we ask for our Minister Rev. Tina Lyndon. Guide and keep her safe and in good health as she works amongst us in these difficult times.

Dear Lord we ask for your blessings on those who are sorrowing, suffering health or family problems or struggling with major decisions. We name them silently in our hearts ——————. May they know your comfort and peace.

Slowly spend a moment with each sentence and leave pauses between the sentences.
