Readings

Exodus 17:1-7

17 From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the LORD commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. ² The people quarrelled with Moses and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the LORD?" ³ But the people thirsted there for water, and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" ⁴ So Moses cried out to the LORD, "What shall I do for this people? They are almost ready to stone me." ⁵ The LORD said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile and go. ⁶ I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. ⁷ He called the place Massah^[a] and Meribah,^[b] because the Israelites quarrelled and tested the LORD, saying, "Is the LORD among us or not?"

Philippians 2:1-13


2 If, then, there is any comfort in Christ, any consolation from love, any partnership in the Spirit, any tender affection and sympathy, ² make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. ³ Do nothing from selfish ambition or empty conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. ⁴ Let each of you look not to your own interests but to the interests of others. ⁵ Let the same mind be in you that was^[a] in Christ Jesus, ⁶ who, though he existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be grasped, ⁷ but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, assuming human likeness. And being found in appearance as a human, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death— even death on a cross. ⁹ Therefore God exalted him even more highly and gave him the name that is above every other name, ¹⁰ so that at the name given to Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

¹² Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence but much more now in my absence, work on your own salvation with fear and trembling, ¹³ for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure.

Matthew 21:23-32

²³ When he entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" ²⁴ Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. ²⁵ Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why, then, did you not believe him?' ²⁶ But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd, for all regard John as a prophet." ²⁷ So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things.

²⁸ "What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' ²⁹ He answered, 'I will not,' but later he changed his mind and went. ³⁰ The father^[a] went to the second and said the same, and he answered, 'I go, sir,' but he did not go. ³¹ Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. ³² For John came to you in the way of righteousness, and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him, and even after you saw it you did not change your minds and believe him.



Young At Heart - Being Thirsty - Rev Tina

The people have been complaining and are afraid. They are thirsty and have no water. They blame Moses. So, Moses takes his worries to God and fears the people will stone him

But they are in the middle of a desert, men, women, children, babies, livestock. Things are dire and they are suffering. They ask: Where is God? People demand proof God is with them in their midst. As instructed by God Moses strikes a rock with his staff, the symbol of his authority from God. Sure enough, water comes gushing out of the rock. God is true and faithful to his people and provides for them.

Have you ever felt like the people or Moses? Sometimes we get down right discouraged and rage against God. We can even blame our bosses, leaders, teachers, parents, spouses for our troubles, those in authority, even the family dog. All of us have our moments when we are having a hard time and doubt God is there, with us. We may even feel abandoned by God.

Sometimes we are so thirsty, nothing will satisfy our thirst. We can be: Thirsty for the truth; Thirsty for love; Thirsty for acknowledgement; Thirsty for comfort. There are many kinds of thirst.

Those in the desert were not just thirsty for water, they were thirsty for God. They needed to be reassured of God's presence and care for them because they were doing it tough. And God provided. He worked through Moses. We are here today because we want God to satisfy our thirst and we hunger to be fed spiritually.

We too are being reassured of God's presence. There are signs of life appearing amongst us, so believe God will never fail us. Never leaves us. God Loves us. All of us. God will never fail us.

Reflection - The choices we make. Rev Tina In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, amen.



RCL

Jesus' parable about the man with two sons is intriguing. The first son says, '*Absolutely not*!' Then he changes his mind and goes and helps his father in the vineyard. The other son says, '*Sure I'll go*.' But he doesn't go.

I found this painting of the Father and his two sons. Both sons seem burdened in some way. One son has his hand raised up as if to say no to his father's request. The other looks defeated in some way. I wonder what's going on here and why the two brothers behaved so differently?

One brother said he would go and then he changed his mind and didn't go. Maybe he is the one looking defeated or like he is regretting his choice. I wonder why he didn't act. Perhaps he didn't feel ready. Perhaps he was more concerned about worldly things or worried or had obligations or felt unworthy in some way.

The other brother who said he wouldn't go, the one who may have raised his hand and refused his father's request, was the one who changed his mind, and went. I wonder what changed his mind. Was it a teaching he heard that planted a seed in his heart where it took root and moved him to hunger and thirst for God, where he embraced God's call. Something must have moved his heart to respond.

One acts and the other fails to act. Perhaps many of us have felt the call of God where our hearts are strangely warmed and at first, we are enthusiastic. Then we procrastinate and choose not to act and later on have regretted our inaction. Perhaps some of us have felt the call and done a Jonah and gone far away, as far as possible to avoid having to respond and act.


I can identify with both responses in my life. Calls are scary. They mean change and risk and taking a step of faith and acting without knowing the outcome. They mean accepting the "Follow me" call and leaving parts of our life behind so we can embrace the new and grow. It means pain sometimes and effort and it takes faith and hope and most of all love for God and the willingness to allow God to fill our whole horizon. It means sticking it out when no one believes in you or your call. It means being sent. It means expanding our heart. That's a little of what God's call means to me. It may mean something different to you. We are all unique and equally loved and called by God. Of course, the point of the parable is to challenge the chief priests. They knew thousands sought out John the Baptist and his authority came from God. They hadn't given Jesus authority to teach in the temple, but they knew he taught with authority. They'd listened and watched the crowds respond to his teachings.

Jesus tells them the parable to challenge them to rethink how they treat people who they think are outside God's grace, when they have not responded to God's call to be loving. Jesus says to them in the only way they can hear him, look, tax collectors and prostitutes are getting into heaven, not you lot. No doubt they were infuriated by this because they believed they were the Holy ones. After all they obeyed the rules and set the rules. What Jesus is saying when he mentions John's baptism of repentance and the thousands who embraced it is that those who are repenting and changing their lives are getting into heaven. The Chief priests have hardened their hearts and are not open to repentance or to God's love and mercy.

The parable that Jesus tells the chief priests draws the crowds and us into the drama of what it means to change our lives and respond to God's call.

So, what's the good news for us in today's gospel?

Perhaps, during our lives, we may have been like both brothers where we've needed to make decisions about how we respond or not respond to the stirrings of the Spirit in our hearts. There may have been times of action and inaction for us or times when we felt deep satisfaction about responding or times when we regretted inaction. That's life and very human.

I wonder if by being here today we may be seeking what's in our hearts. We know we find spiritual food, are fed by the Word, comforted by prayer and are in communion with Christ and one another.

All of this so we can go out into the world and respond to God's call to put our faith into action in God's immense vineyard.

We know we grow more and more into Christ when we are spiritually fed and act on our faith.

We are a community in Christ who are infused with the deep love and compassion generated by the Spirit in our soul. A Spirit who creates a common bond of mutual love between all of us.

I wonder if Paul's letter to the church in Philippi helps us understand more, just a little.



He writes his letter to a community undergoing changes, challenges, and suffering, like we have been and still are. Paul encourages the church at Philippi to continue to respond to God's call and live faithfully according to the gospel where they remain united and of the same mind, love, and soul. Perhaps this can encourage us to do the same.

Paul encourages members of the church at Philippi to choose self-emptying above self-interest and to have high regard for others rather than self-ambition, to have humility rather than empty self-glory and regard the interests of others, rather than their own interests all the time. Perhaps there is a message for us in this too.

Like the two sons there are choices to be made in life. Fact is, we face choices on a day-to-day basis on how we respond to God's call and the gospel way of life.

All of us are on a journey together and it's had its moments.

COVID has set us many challenges and we may at times have felt afraid or lonely or frustrated or down right fed up, like we're over it!! We have thought or said, 'Just one more challenge or change and I'll scream!!' I'm sick and tired of going with the flow and adapting. I'm over it!! This is endless! When will things get better?

Have you ever had a day like that?

We are all in it together. Believe the sun is slowly coming out again, and it's time to answer some of those calls from God to go and work in the vineyard. It's time to act and discern what resources we have and how best to use them.

Do not doubt God is with us. We must remain faithful and remember prayer is the engine that drives God's mission amongst us. Let us be like the son who, despite hesitations, chose to go and serve God.

We are called to remain faithful to God and respond to His call, according to our gifts and graces and to do this not for our self, but for each other and for the glory of God.
