Reflection: Anne Smith, Blackburn North Nunawading

What an amazing experience, expressed in the language of poetry, to grip that community. And what an enormous change we see experienced in their lives. Even at this distance in time we are struck by the difference.

We notice, too, the very different responses shown to the experience:

- those who rejoiced because they felt the wonder was available to them
 - "they heard it in their own language"
- those who predictably scoffed
 - are they not always with us, onlookers, comfortable as they are? Ever ready with put downs?
- and those who picked it up and ran with it.

We can relate to this today – haven't we seen a sudden unimagined change, – hasn't the corona virus tipped our lives upside down?

But in this time of such enormous change – as was experienced at Pentecost – we belong with the group who rejoiced, remembering that the Spirit, healer, helper, guide, continues with us, and is entwined in every aspect of worship and life – even sometimes jolting us into the future.

And so, I share with you a prayer for the times of change from Kathy Galloway of the Iona Community, remembering that we too make a response to the Spirit who remains with us today:

God of our lives
with the Spirit

you are always calling us to follow you into the future,
inviting us to new ventures, new challenges,
new ways to care,
new ways to touch the hearts of all.

When we are fearful of the unknown, give us courage.
When we worry that we are not up to the task,
remind us that you would not call us
if you did not believe in us.

When we get tired,
or feel disappointed with the way things are going,
remind us that we can bring change and hope
out of the most difficult situations.

1 Corinthians 12: 3b-13

12:3b No one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit. 12:4 Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; 12:5 and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; 12:6 and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. 12:7 To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. 12:8 To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, 12:9 to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, 12:10 to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. 12:11 All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses. 12:12 For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. 12:13 For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body – Jews or Greeks, slaves or free – and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Reflection: David Smith, Forest Hill

What an amazing reading this is. 1 Corinthians 12:3 gives us an understanding of the Spirit by which Christians can been empowered to speak. "No one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit."

The Spirit of God, the Spirit of truth, the Holy Spirit has enabled the people of God, the followers of Jesus, to proclaim "Jesus is Lord".

It reminds me of the reading where Moses is sent by God to have the Hebrew people freed, and he tells Moses in Exodus 4:11-12, God says, "I will be with your mouth and I will teach you what you are to speak." God will give Moses the words he needs. The Father who created all of us, gives to all His people, in His service, the words they need. And now we are told in our reading today that, "No one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit." Except by the Spirit of God, the Spirit Jesus promised.

That same Spirit of God that rested upon the surface of the earth at creation, would now fill the mouth of Moses and Aaron, over 14 hundred years before Jesus, so that what God wanted said, would be said. And now in that locked room with the disciples in Jerusalem, over 1400 years later from Moses, that same Spirit of the Father is delivering the promise of Jesus, is at work within His people, and making it impossible for those who do not have His Spirit, to say with any truth at all, that "Jesus is Lord". But we can, because of Jesus.

Pentecost is the time when God no longer waited. Jesus tells us that the same Spirit that he was empowered by, would empower us to do even greater things than he did. John 14:12.

We read today in verse 4, 5 and 6 the means by, or the power by which this is all possible.

Verse 4, "the same Spirit", verse 5, "the same Lord", verse 6, "the same God".

By the same power of the Father of creation, we are made able to proclaim that "Jesus is Lord".

Through the Spirit which He places within us, we can proclaim that "Jesus is Lord".

But the same power that enables us to proclaim this, doesn't stop there. We are now since Pentecost, given greater authority in Jesus name. By the same Spirit of God, His gifts are now poured out for His glory. His Spirit delivers a variety of gifts, a variety of service and a variety of working. All from the same Spirit, the same Lord, the same God. Verse 6 tells us that it's the same God that inspires them all, in everyone who believes in Jesus.

What happened in that locked room was an amazing event, a world changing event that continues to happen even today. God calls and empowers His people. God's Spirit is still being poured out, for the purpose of, as in verse 7, "for the common good." "... the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good."

God's Spirit, through His people, through the believers in Jesus, can have the utterance of wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing, miracles, prophecy, discernment, tongues and the interpretation of tongues.

Has anything ever been impossible for the Father of creation? All this is made possible through His Spirit.

And it is now poured out on His people, the people who believe in His Son, our Saviour, Jesus.

Pentecost, the outpouring as promised, the receiving of God's Spirit.

Pentecost wasn't just an historical event, it's a daily event that we celebrate today, for those who believe. God's Spirit is still being poured out. The "manifestation of the Spirit for the common good."

Luke 24:49, Jesus said, "I am sending upon you what my Father promised." And God sent His Spirit. And God gave it and apportioned by the Spirit to each as he wills.

Under the Spirit of God, we are one body, one people, redeemed, renewed, and empowered by the one God. No Jew nor Greek, no slave nor free, all one people under the Spirit from which we all drink, His Spirit, our God. Amen

Reflection: Tina Lyndon, Mountview

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen



I read an article called, *Captured Moments*, in *The Age* on Wednesday. It was about a photographer called Hugh Stewart who set up a Popup studio in his garage and set out to capture the experiences and emotions of people experiencing life in lockdown and all he used was Facetime and a computer monitor. What he did was interview people, some of them well-known and asked them, *'How would you like to see the world change after Covid-19?'* Everyone wanted things to be different and didn't want to go back to how things were. They wanted the world to be a better place, that was kinder, where people were more considerate. Many of us also hope that the world will be a better place.

In today's gospel the disciples were in lockdown. The doors to the house were locked and they were afraid of being arrested as followers of Jesus and possibly crucified. The disciples were hiding in fear behind those closed doors. They thought Jesus was dead, that it was all over and his mission had failed. Perhaps they were feeling despondent, depressed and discouraged.

It's evening on Easter Day. Jesus has risen from the dead and suddenly he appeared amongst his disciples and said to them, 'Peace be with you.'

They must have doubted. Why else would Jesus show his wounds.

Once they were convinced it was Jesus, I wonder whether they felt joy, relief, comfort, amazement, awe and some of God's transforming Shalom in their hearts.

Again, Jesus says, 'Peace be with you.'


Like many others, I've pondered about this peace and what it might be like.

Perhaps it involves, wholeness, blessing, intimacy with God or can be felt during worship or prayer. Last year I travelled down the Great Ocean Road and saw a man standing on a board with a paddle, paddling towards the sunrise. As I watched him, it seemed like he was all lit up by the sunlight and engulfed in the light. Perhaps the peace Jesus offers us is like this, engulfing us, surrounding and filling us with light and life. Perhaps this peace involves God's extraordinary love for us, poured into our hearts through the Spirit or it's that moment when we become one with God through the Spirit. Perhaps all of this is God's Shalom.

On Easter Day Jesus comes to commission his disciples. They longed for better world, but Jesus wasn't there to change their world. He was there to commission them to go out and change the world. He told them he was sending them out into the world, like God sent him. He breathed the Holy Spirit upon them and commissioned them to bring the gift of forgiveness to the world, that lifechanging forgiveness that sets people free and brings peace into people's hearts.

I've wondered why the disciples were also commissioned not to forgive.

Perhaps it was to allow time for the spirit to work in people's hearts, until they were ready for forgiveness or time for the Spirit to work in their heart's as they turned their lives around, that one-hundred-and-eighty-degrees life changing turnabout, called repentance, which was one of the hallmarks of Jesus ministry.



Now the disciples will continue Jesus ministry, witnessing about the life of Jesus and proclaiming his gospel to all, who will listen. We can do the same in how we live out the gospel in our lives, where the Spirit works through us, helping us make the world a better place.

I'll finish with a story. My neighbours were putting out the bins on Wednesday night and both of us were standing in front of our homes, waiting to see who would say hello first and we both ended up not saying hello. The man next door was watching us and came up to them and proceeded to show them photos of his grandchildren. That night the Spirit moved my heart as I prayed and realised lockdown had made me far too reserved. Next day when my husband and I rode our bikes to the park, I decided to greet as many people as possible and try and brighten up their day. After saying hello to several people, as we pedalled our bikes around the circuit for walking and bike riding, I met a lady with her elderly mum, who had her walker. On this first round of the circuit, we said hello to one another and smiled, and she encouraged me, 'You'll make it.' On the second round she pointed out a tawny frogmouth in the tree which we stopped to admire. On the third round she told me that it has a mate and to watch out for it. I promised to look out for it the next day. This lady and her mum ended up making my day. This is how the Spirit works through us and helps us make the world a better place, by inspiring us to reach out to one another with love.

Prayers of the People and the Lord's Prayer

John William's has prepared the Prayers of the people for you today

Our international cycle this week takes us to Southern Africa and the nations of Lesotho, Namibia, Swaziland and South Africa. All are regarded as Christian countries with around 80% claiming allegiance. Economically, South Africa is well endowed and the other three are heavily dependent on it for income, large numbers of their males working in mines and agriculture.

Lesotho is totally landlocked by S.A. The absence of males makes this mountainous plateau one where women assume great responsibility. Swaziland is also landlocked but is not as dependent on S.A. as Lesotho. Namibia is largely desert with a sparse population.

All are members of the Commonwealth of Nations, and, although many tribal languages are spoken, English is common to all. All have a very high incidence of H.I.V. due to sexual violence. I pray.

Dear Lord, you hear the prayers of your people in South Africa and its very close neighbours. There will be very many from women who have be violated by men or who live in fear of their male neighbours. Guide the leaders in these lands as they endeavour to bring about a change of attitude in regard to women and their molestation. Please, hear my prayer for the women of southern Africa.

St. John's Anglican Church in Blackburn is struggling to maintain a viable congregation due mainly to most members being quite elderly. Currently on-line worship is being held in partnership with Holy Trinity, Doncaster. I pray.

Gracious and loving God. The people at St. John's Anglican Church in Blackburn have been faithful to the Gospel for very many years. Despite different programs aimed at building their numbers, they have not been rewarded with success. Their regular gathered worship has maintained their mutual support for each other. Please, Lord, grant them what is needed to maintain their fellowship so that when these virus restrictions are relaxed, they may experience great joy as they again meet each other.

May the praise they offer on that day be memorable. Sustain the personal hope of each one that one day each will be with you in glory, casting down their golden crown, lost in wonder, love and praise.

May their Doncaster brethren give and receive joys from their combined fellowship. Lord, this is my plea for the folk at St. John's at Blackburn.

In Darebin West, close to Preston is a Uniting Church with much initiative. For one – they have set up a kitchen providing food to homeless people in the area for whom finding food during the virus social distancing rules has not been easy. On some days, about 80 people are served. It must have given the members young and old a great challenge and aa sense of co-operative fun. They produced a video of the well-known item from Handel's "The Messiah", the 'Hallelujah Chorus'. While a choir sings, the words are displayed in a continuous stream on flip cards held by young and old in all sorts of unexpected locations. I think it is brilliant and I recommend you to Google *Darebin West Uniting Church's* web page and scroll down to hallelujah. I pray.

Dear God of wisdom and fellowship, I thank you for the initiatives being shown by the people who gather to worship you in Darebin West. They care for others and reach out in many ways. Maintain and strengthen their range of programs running during the virus restrictions. May their initiatives already in place be a firm foundation on which to build when the restrictions are eased. Grant them joy. May peace be like warm sunshine surrounding them. Enable them to share that peace with the community round about. This is my plea for the Darebin West Congregation.

All wise God, it is a given that your church here on earth must have good, strong and well-prepared leadership. The *Centre for Theology and Ministry* is charged with the responsibility of taking candidates and students through a time of deep learning and self-assessment to be ultimately ordained into Christian Ministry. **I pray.**

Loving Lord, in the days before our risen Jesus ascended to be reigning with you, he commissioned his disciples to go and tell all peoples of the earth of the Good News of the Gospel. Some in our midst feel that commission calls them to minister to your people – they have heard your voice calling. They submit themselves to rigorous discipline and total commitment-they give their life to you. Support them through their commitment. Help them maintain the discipline of study. Stoke the 'fire in their bellies'. May those who lecture and discuss, who mentor and encourage, who measure and point the way also remain dedicated to their special calling. Be their ever-present guide and helper, their strength and stay. Should there be doubts, quell them with your ever-present love. This is my prayer for those in training and their teaching staff.

I consider our own fellowship at Mountview and bring to mind those who are in need of special care.

Judy Ralston is doing quite well in care. There were grave doubts that her condition would respond to treatment, but her doctors decided to keep trying, so far with gratifying results. Ask the good Lord to open up new possibilities for Judy, and to continue to keep her in good spirits.

Des Kidd is about halfway through a course of treatment and is also responding very well.

Ask the good Lord to maintain his positive outlook and courage in his adversity.

I call to mind those who are coming to grips with the passing of Margaret Edgington, especially son, Alastair.

I also call to mind the passing of Lorraine Hill. Please grant to her family peace and fond memories.

Let me give thought to those who are living alone, separated from family for various reasons.

Inspire us of the Mountview Congregation to be more responsive and set a target of phone calls each day.

I pray. Dear God of love and compassion, we have mentioned some people with special needs, but there are many others who are quietly bearing loads. I name them to you...

Merciful God, grant meaning to those who spend long hours of the night in pain or bewilderment of mind or even lost in a fog of distorted memory.

I ask that you continue to give to our minister, Tina, continuing new inspiration as she weekly delivers to us worship notes to "keep us in touch". Keep her in good health and grant her quiet sleep.

Loving, comforting Lord, these are the desires of my heart this day. Please hear my prayers. **Amen**. *The Lord's Prayer:*

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your Name, your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us in the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours – now and for ever. **Amen**.

We will go to offer ourselves to those in need



This week we focus on the Prayer Of The Heart

Prayer is nothing but Love. Augustine

Speak, God to the heart of your servant, that my heart may speak to you. Giogo II the Carthusian Henri Nouwen, a well-known theologian wrote in his daily devotional: *Bread for the Journey* "When Jesus disciples ask him where do we start? Jesus say: Love God with all your heart and soul and mind, love your neighbour and love yourself. Our whole being is called upon to know how it feels like to love.

Jesus comes to write the law of love upon our hearts. Our heart lies deep within us. Like the organ pumping blood around our body, our inner orientation is hidden, yet vital. As we give our hearts in love to God as we become aware of the Holy Spirit already praying in us, with sighs too deep to fully comprehend, our relationship with God is born and sustained through the Holy Spirit. In our heart, our truest most real self, God greets us and draws us toward life in the Holy Trinity of Love."

This week you are invited to come before God, in a quiet place where you won't be interrupted.

Relax and try to become aware of what your heart is feeling. What is God's longing within you today?

What are your longings and desires? How is the Spirit of God moving your heart? You could read a passage from the bible or from With Love to the World and try to discern where you are drawn, whether it's to a verse or image that's evoked from reading scripture or whether you'd prefer to close your eyes and imagine yourself within a story from the bible. How is your heart being moved? What is God calling you to do today?

Perhaps it's to phone someone or post a card or letter or visit a loved one or greet someone when you go for a walk or speak to your neighbour.

Henri Nouwen, also wrote this in his daily devotional: *Bread for the Journey*The Spirit reveals to us not only that God is "Abba, Father" but also that we belong to God as beloved Children.
The Spirit thus restores in us the relationship from which all other relationships derive their meaning.

Abba is a very intimate word. The best translation for it is "Daddy."

The word Abba expresses trust, safety, confidence, belonging, and most of all intimacy. It does not have the connotation of authority, power, and control that the word **Father** often evokes. On the contrary, Abba implies an embracing and nurturing love. This love includes and infinitely transcends all the love that comes to us from our fathers, mothers, brothers, sisters, spouses, friends, and lovers. It is the gift of the Spirit.

For the Young at Heart

The other day my daughter and granddaughter joined me at the Botanical Gardens. It was a beautiful sunny day and when my granddaughter saw the piles of leaves on the path's she couldn't resist running through them and kicking them up into the air and throwing them at us. Neither could we. Autumn leaves are beautiful this time of year. They are the colour of Pentecost – gold, yellow, orange, pink, crimson and reds and look like jewels when the sun shines through them. Collect some with your children or grandchildren and make a collage with them for Pentecost, of flames. Use one as a bookmark this weekend. Take time out to play with the leaves with or without children and go for a walk and admire them later in the afternoon, when the sun shines through the leaves.
