Reading: Matthew 22:15-22 (NIRV)

¹⁵ The Pharisees went out. They made plans to trap Jesus with his own words. ¹⁶ They sent their followers to him. They sent the Herodians with them. "Teacher," they said, "we know that you are a man of honour. You teach the way of God truthfully. You don't let others tell you what to do or say. You don't care how important they are. ¹⁷ Tell us then, what do you think? Is it right to pay the royal tax to Caesar or not?"

¹⁸ But Jesus knew their evil plans. He said, "You pretenders! Why are you trying to trap me? ¹⁹ Show me the coin people use for paying the tax." They brought him a silver coin. ²⁰ He asked them, "Whose picture is this? And whose words?"

²¹ "Caesar's," they replied.

Then he said to them, "So give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar. And give back to God what belongs to God."

²² When they heard this, they were amazed. So, they left him and went away. *

Reflection: "LIFE between a rock and a hard place."

We have all heard the expression, "between a rock and a hard place." It expresses the frustration of not knowing where to turn.

Our Gospel reading today tells the story of Jesus' reply to a group of Jewish leaders that were trying to trap him. He found himself between a rock and a hard place with their question. In an amazing



way, he found a way of answering them that found LIFE between the rock and hard place. Let's examine this further.

Among the many bizarre stories about the North Korean dictator, Kim Jong-un, was one a few years back reporting that he had given an order that all male university students in the country were to have their hair cut in a style that imitated his own. Such displays of ego often seem a bit comical, but there is a long history of political rulers demanding similar sorts of worship from their subjects. In the ancient world, such leaders just came right out and declared themselves to be gods, and insisted that the people worship them as such, on pain of death. Kim Jong-un's haircut edict seems relatively tame by comparison.

There is another example going on in the background of the gospel reading about the attempt to trap Jesus with a question about paying taxes to the Romans. The question was a trap because the Romans were a hated foreign occupation force, and the Jewish people deeply resented paying taxes to them, so if Jesus said, "Yes, you should pay your taxes to the Romans," his popularity rating would take a plunge in the next opinion polls. But of course, if he said, "No, refuse to pay the tax," he would probably be arrested by the Romans within minutes, and the Jewish authorities would have got rid of him without having to lift a hand themselves. Jesus found himself between a rock and a hard place.

It seemed like the perfect trap. But Jesus manages to spring the trap without getting himself caught in it. "Show me the coin used for the tax," he says, and they hand him a coin. Snap! He's got them already. This incident took place inside the temple precinct, and you were not supposed to bring such a coin into the temple. That's why they had money changers at the temple.

Jesus's question points straight to the reason you weren't allowed to bring these coins into the temple: "Whose image is this, and whose title?" The image on the coin was the emperor's and the inscription read, "Tiberius Caesar, Son of God, high priest." To any devoutly religious Jew, that made the coin a blasphemous idol, an insult to God. Certainly not something you could bring into the sacred temple that was holy to the one true God of Israel. So, Jesus has already gained the upper hand in the argument when the Pharisees make the strategic error of letting it be seen that they have carried this despised image into the temple.

Then he said to them, **"So give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar. And give back to God what belongs to God."** When they heard this, they were amazed. So, they left him and went away. The LIFE we find in Jesus' reply is that we believe everything belongs to God. The difficulty arose in earlier years that this saying of Jesus gave credence to the division between State and Church. It has been used by many to say that the church should keep its nose out of politics.

Last weekend's referendum was a case in point. There were those who pointed their finger at the Uniting Church for taking a stance and leading their people towards a "YES" vote for the constitutional change. There were also those who commented that Sports Clubs that identified with the "YES" Vote were wrong. They said you should keep politics out of sport. Such a blanket understanding that differentiates between Christian faith and politics has nothing to do with what Jesus was saying. He found the LIFE between the two hard places. The whole of LIFE belongs to God, even people like Caesar.

Now many of us who voted YES last weekend are understandably in grief at the result. Our 74% of indigenous people who voted YES have had another nock back to their race. I can't imagine how those who were involved in the "Uluru Statement from the Heart" must be feeling. So now our nation is caught between the "YES" and the "NO" hard place. What now? I believe if we look hard enough the Spirit of Love and Reconciliation can find LIFE between this rock and hard place. Perhaps never in the Nation's history has there been such a focus on the first people of this land. While there is a lot of hurt, some racism, and political score keeping, the plight of our indigenous people has never been so sharply in the fore front of the media and people's minds. Even those in the "NO" camp believe that we need to do something different than we have done in the past. NOW is the opportunity for NEW BEGINNINGS in bringing reconciliation and equality to our first peoples. There is LIFE between the hard places.

A very close colleague of mine disclosed in the last week that her husband was now in care. None of us knew that for three years she had battled with her loving husband declining in health with dementia. He is a lovely, intelligent man who has lived a full and generous life with his gifts and talents. My friend found herself between a rock and a hard place. Coping with grief of losing the husband she knew and loved to this disease, having a 101-year-old mother she supported and trying to find herself amid all the demands. She shared with us that her husband is now in Uniting AgeWell care and very appreciative of the NEW LIFE she is finding for them both.

Many reading this reflection will identify with being between a rock and a hard place sometime in their lives. My prayer is that each one will find the insight to see that all things will change and fade in our lives, but **LOVE, FAITH and HOPE** will never be eradicated. These three things bring us LIFE. Amen.
