

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The Khesed of God - Rev Tina

In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, amen.

'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.'



The Hebrew word for love is Khesed.

My husband and I met a long time ago and we felt this strong bond, a bond that has endured through all the ups and downs of life and our relationship, the good and the bad. We have loved each other with Khesed.

I'm well aware that marriage isn't an easy road. There are ups and downs, renegotiations, often when change and growth happens, there are shared joys and sorrows, and sometimes heartbreak. For some couples, they may have a better relationship when they are not

together.

When I pray, I'm reminded of something someone said to me in a chance encounter. Brother Angelo was sitting next to me on a flight from Rome to Israel. He was a monk from a closed religious order, the Little Family of the resurrection, who have a monastery on the Mount of Olives near Jerusalem.

He shared a lot of wisdom with me on the flight, including wisdom about marriage.

"The man has the will of the woman, and the woman has the will of the husband and together they discover the love of Christ in one another."

Often a great deal of peacemaking and forgiveness takes place and permission giving, healing, and selfless generosity, where Christ is found in one another. Perhaps the will the monk spoke of was more about Khesed.

Khesed is unconditional love and acceptance of others and self, it is generosity towards others and self, and it is an enduring commitment towards one another. You may have experienced Khesed from your parents, siblings, friends and brothers or sisters in Christ, from your church community.

There are many examples of Khesed and you may have stories to share. These a few of my stories.



Three times now I've experienced men making holding crosses for me to give to people for prayer and comfort. Ian had a workshop at the back of Brighton Uniting and made one hundred crosses, and his mate Brian varnished them and then took them across the road to the Monsignor at the Catholic church who would bless them. Then Ian gave them to me, and I'd find homes for them. They ended up all over the country and overseas and some people held them as they died and were buried with them. When they ran out, Perce Box aged in his late nineties from Eltham Montmorency made another hundred and they too found homes. Recently Lorraine at our Mitcham site arranged for her nephew to make another

hundred and they are finding homes.

Women have made lace for the tablecloths for the Lord's table, banners and stoles, casseroles for people doing it tough and cakes for special occasions. Such love and generosity and commitment to their church community is Khesed.



This is a photo of a group of people from Templestowe Uniting, now Manningham Uniting. They went on regular retreats to Pallotti College to deepen their relationship with God and one another. This too is Khesed.

Wesley didn't have an easy time preaching in the fields. Sometimes people opposed his ministry. He was said to have written this hymn during a difficult time to remind himself of how much God loves him. So Wesley wrote a hymn called O love that wilt not let me go:

O Love that wilt not let me go,
I rest my weary soul in thee:
I give thee back the life I owe,
that in thine ocean depths its flow
may richer, fuller be.

Sometimes when we are having a difficult time we need to pray or sing hymns or read the bible to remind us of God's faithfulness to us. This is Khesed.

Today's Psalm 90 speaks of God being our dwelling place, of God's steadfast love for us, God's power over all, and God's favour with us. The Psalm invites us to be glad and happy in the Lord where we bless others through the works of our hands and in what we do for God, others, and ourselves. It's a reminder of God's Khesed for us. We are invited to love God with all our being and to accept the tapestry of life with all its ups and downs. We are to be generous towards God with our time and resources and be committed to God and living God's ways to show our Khesed.

If you've ever had a pet, you may have experienced Khesed. Our pets love and accept us, warts, and all, as we experience their generosity and love. These are a few photos of animals.

Misty was our cat and loved us for 23 years. She faithfully stuck by us as we stuck by her. Towards the end I'd take her to the vet to be put on saline drips because she had kidney problems. She depended on me.

Moses my dog greets us when we come home and every morning. He sits on our lap and is totally dependent on our generosity, love, and commitment to care for him. Our Khesed.







Then there is Mabel the chook. I was walking Moses in the park and saw someone with something wrapped up in a white towel and got the impression they were dumping an animal. Next day Moses and I are walking past the spot and there was Mable. She'd obviously survived the night sheltering in the toilet block, where foxes didn't find her. I enlisted the help of a man and his two sons. We tried to corner her and catch her. You can imagine what that was like. As soon as we got close and thought we had her she ran between us. The two boys were laughing non-stop. We decided to change our strategy and chased her into the toilet block and threw a towel on her. When I asked them: Do you want to take her home the dad said: No way. So, I was stuck with a chook. I put her in our cubby house for the night and fed her food scraps. Next day I popped her in a box and drove to a property along the Yarra to see if they had lost her and they had a chook pen full of chooks. We had a cuppa and negotiated Mable's future while we waited for the lady's mum to come home, and she offered Mable a home. When she put Mable in the chook pen the box chook pecked at her, while Mable didn't care less. She was too busy stuffing herself full of chook food. It was a happy ending for her. Animals need our care and commitment, our Khesed.



This is a picture of one of the silos in the Mallee region. You may be familiar with sheep dogs, who are faithful to their owner and listen for their voice and watch for their commands. If you've ever watched a shepherd and sheep dog work together to round up sheep, it's like they are of one mind, united together for one purpose, rounding up the sheep.



If you look at the sculpture of Jesus, praying for his disciples, it's the Mount of Olives where they were praying and fell asleep. Instead of being there for Jesus in his hour of need, Jesus understood they were exhausted after all the things that had happened as they followed him through all the challenges of their ministry and knew more challenging times were ahead. He let them sleep, prayed for them, accepted them, understood them. This is Khesed.



Many of us have family stories about our descendants. This is my great-great grandfather James McIntosh from Yackandandah. He is remembered for liking his tea to be hot, like I do. We all have relatives who have funny little habits they are remembered for long after they die. We also remember acts of kindness that have inspired us.

This lady is pushing another lady along the beach at Wilsons Prom. She did it for hours, up and down the beach. It looked difficult at times. It was a long walk through the soft sand from the car park to the beach, to the firmer sand near the shoreline. But the look of joy on the elderly woman's face as she was being pushed along the beach was worth it for the woman who pushed her wheelchair. She made her day a joyful one. She'd blessed her. They'd blessed each other. This is Khesed.

Love, acceptance, generosity, and commitment in action. God's Khesed in us.

Joan Chittister wrote of the Twilight time, in her book: *The gift of the years: Growing Older gracefully*. (Used with permission)

The twilight time, like all the time before it, is not for nothing. It has its own tasks, its burdens, its subtle gifts to give us. The twilight time is a time for trust. It's all out of our hands now. We have used our last year's well. We have lived with all the energy we had. And now we must trust the time of no energy at all to make us open in a different way to those around us. We must trust our doctors and our caregivers and our situation and our passage. We must allow ourselves to be cared for and trust the people doing it are receiving something from us, as we receive from them.

It is time now to surrender to acceptance. Perhaps for the first time in our adult lives we will go into a period of total dependence.
