#### Readings

#### 1 Kings 19:1-15a

**19** Ahab told Jezebel all that Elijah had done and how he had killed all the prophets with the sword. <sup>2</sup>Then Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah, saying, "So may the gods do to me and more also, if I do not make your life like the life of one of them by this time tomorrow." <sup>3</sup>Then he was afraid;<sup>[a]</sup> he got up and fled for his life and came to Beer-sheba, which belongs to Judah; he left his servant there.

<sup>4</sup> But he himself went a day's journey into the wilderness and came and sat down under a solitary broom tree. He asked that he might die, "It is enough; now, O LORD, take away my life, for I am no better than my ancestors." <sup>5</sup> Then he lay down under the broom tree and fell asleep. Suddenly an angel touched him and said to him, "Get up and eat." <sup>6</sup> He looked, and there at his head was a cake baked on hot stones and a jar of water. He ate and drank and lay

For a long time he had not worn<sup>[b]</sup> any clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. <sup>28</sup> When he saw Jesus, he cried out and fell down before him, shouting, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me," <sup>29</sup> for Jesus<sup>[c]</sup> had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with

chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) <sup>30</sup> Jesus then asked him, "What is your name?" He said, "Legion," for many demons had entered him. <sup>31</sup> They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss.

<sup>32</sup> Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding, and the demons<sup>[d]</sup> begged Jesus<sup>[e]</sup> to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. <sup>33</sup> Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd stampeded down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned.

<sup>34</sup> When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. <sup>35</sup> Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they became frightened. <sup>36</sup> Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. <sup>37</sup> Then the whole throng of people of the surrounding region of the Gerasenes<sup>[1]</sup> asked Jesus<sup>[2]</sup> to leave them, for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. <sup>38</sup> The man from whom the demons had gone out begged that he might be with him, but Jesus<sup>[h]</sup> sent him away, saying, <sup>39</sup> "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you." ## **Sermon - Where do we find God?** In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen

Gorak Shep village, near Everest

I've always been drawn to the mountains and climbing up them. When I was climbing to Everest Base Camp, I met a man from Holland doing a documentary where he was filming people and interviewing them. He was asking people why they were climbing to Everest. He seemed surprised, maybe even impressed (I hope) to meet someone "my age", a granny, climbing. He asked me why I was climbing up the mountain and I replied: *I find God in the mountains*. He was silent for a moment and then put his hand over his heart, and looking close to tears, said: *That's profound*. Next day, when I fell off the mountain close to Base Camp, and was being carried along on a bed of small boulders to certain death, God found me. I felt people praying for me and put out my right leg and it hit the only rock sticking up at the edge of the ledge and I came to an abrupt halt, and obviously didn't go over or die. But the sense of connection with the universe, the peace beyond all understanding and sense of expansion was beyond words. It was God.

The reading from 1 Kings has always been a favourite of mine. Here is Elijah hiding in a cave on Mount Horeb. He is afraid of being killed by Jezebel. God found him and asked him: *What are you doing here Elijah*?

Elijah tells God all about his faithfulness and fear of being killed by Jezebel. Then, God asked Elijah to move out of the cave and to go and stand on the mountain. Then Elijah experiences winds so strong they split mountains and rocks into pieces and earthquakes and fires, but God isn't in this display of creation's power and turmoil. Elijah hears the sound of sheer silence, and he knows it is God. Have you ever heard and felt the sound of sheer silence? It is the presence of God. There are no words for it. Elijah heard it and wrapped his mantle around his face. Perhaps he felt awe and reverence for God in the silence. There's no words for it.

Again, God asked him: What are you doing here Elijah? Most of us would expect a different answer and that Elijah had been transformed by his experience of God, but he gives the same answer, of faithfulness and fear of being

killed. Despite this, God asked him to return, to go back and to embrace his call and role as a prophet and anoint the new king and he returns.

A Cave

I Kings has shown us God is in sound of sheer silence. I chose the hymn: *Dear Father, Lord of Humankind*, because it speaks of Jesus, kneeling before God, and sharing the silence of eternity with us, a silence interpreted by love. A silence that brings quietness where our soul is stilled, and all our strivings cease, and all strain and stress is taken from us. A silence where we come to know the beauty of God's peace within our soul, just like Elijah came to know God is not in the turmoil, God is in the still small voice of calm.

So where do we find God or where does God find us? Here are some images to ponder about. I wonder why people carve images into rocks or make things out of them or use smaller ones for prayer? Perhaps rocks seem permanent.





This seems like a humble rock. I found it in a pool of water beside a church that is on the Mount of Olives that overlooks Jerusalem. The church is called Dominus Flevit which means: The Lord Wept. Wept because he saw the Second temple and knew it would be destroyed and many Jews would flee and wept because the people of Jerusalem didn't listen to his message. The church is shaped like a teardrop. So is this humble rock, which I held, off and on for many weeks, while I grieved for the death of a family member. Years later while doing clinical pastoral education at a hospital I lent it to a man from South Africa who had left behind everything to come to Australia to be treated for throat cancer. I got to know him and his wife as he tried to communicate by using a white broad. I told him about how I found holding the stone comforting when grieving. His treatment for cancer had failed and he went home to die. About a month later his cousin, a catholic priest returned it to me saying: *He had held it as he was dying and had been able to make his peace with God.* When you consider the connections between Jesus and this rock, God found him. The rock was white quartz when I gave it to him. Now it looks like tear drops have formed in the rock and its colour has been changed by his sweat as he held it.

Many people say they find God in nature, where God surrounds them with beauty.



Others say God finds them where they sense the presence of God's love, where it's comforting, especially when they are unwell or grieving or facing challenges.

Which brings me to Psalms 42 and 43. The psalmist longs for God in his troubles. He wants to see the face of God. People are saying to him: Where is your God? They pour out their soul to God and somehow in their turmoil they hear the still small voice of God, speaking into their soul: Why are you cast down my soul. Hope in God. Deep calls to deep. God calls to their soul, and they are reminded of God's steadfast love for them.

After my parents died, I was given a copy of my great grandfather's bible. His name was Henry Lyndon. When I looked inside his small pocket-sized leather covered bible, I found he had earmarked the page at Psalm 42 and 43 and that he had kept this photo of my grandfather, his son, in his bible. You can see how the photo has been folded in half to fit inside the bible. Perhaps he prayed for my grandfather who fought in WWI, when he was at Gallipoli and in the trenches in France. Perhaps he found the Psalms reassuring whenever he feared for his son's life.



Finally, there is today's gospel, a story of a different world where people believed those with mental health issues or disabilities had demons in them or if they were very ill, had sinned somehow. It must have been a terrible time to live for anyone who had health issues. Thankfully times have changed in many places.

Last time I went to Nepal I met staff working at a charity called Seven Women, founded by a young Australian who found seven disabled women living in a tin shed. These seven women are now leaders at the Centre and have touched the lives of many disadvantaged women.

University of Melbourne has a gallery called the Dax Gallery at the Dax Centre They work with people with a lived experience of mental health issues and provide a safe and supportive environment for artists to exhibit their work, develop their art practice, and offer education programs to school and university students to expand their

understanding of mental health issues and break down stigma. The man I was standing beside had several paintings exhibited and he told me about his drawings, what it is like to have schizophrenia and about the effects of the treatment on his body. I knew him from the healing services at St Paul's Cathedral in the 1990's, where all people were welcome and accepted from all walks of life. To me this witnessed to the Love command of Jesus, where people saw the love of God in one another and community.



There is no one way of knowing God. Experiences of God are as diverse as we are as the people of God. As I said in my Tidbit for this week, I remember a sermon from years ago where a question was asked: *How big is your God box?* Perhaps we cannot limit God. Perhaps when we do, we limit ourselves. Afterall God said: *I am who I am*

May they govern with wisdom and integrity and their decisions be for the benefit of all.

We pray this week for the priest, the parish leaders and the congregation at St Thomas' Catholic Church in Blackburn, and, within the Uniting Church of Australia, we pray for the minister and congregations of the Diamond Valley Parish and the Diamond Creek Church at Hurstbridge. Bless, guide and encourage them all in the fellowship and outreach of their communities.

In the world wide prayer cycle we pray today for the people of Malawi and Zambia. These democratic republics, land locked within the vast continent of Africa, are gradually stabilising after many changes in political leadership and

economic hardship since their independence in the 1960s. They are still very poor and rely on international assistance from the World Bank and the IMF but are gradually increasing their own revenue from mineral exports and agriculture, and Zambia has an emerging solar and hydro-electricity export business. Education is free and universal, and medical services are increasing, but education and health care for women is lagging. HIV Aids is still an ongoing problem and infant mortality is high. Seventy-five per cent of the people are Christian and the Christian churches are increasingly active in education and community care. We pray for the continuing progress in all areas of life in these countries, O Lord, and for continuing international assistance.

Here at Mountview we especially ask for your care and encouragement for our ministers, Rev. Tina, Rev. Peter and for our student minister, Daniel. May they feel your presence as they prepare our worship services, and we thank them for their care during the past two weeks with the extra services required.

Guide us as we leave this morning and hear our prayers, O Lord. Together we pray : Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your name, Your kingdom come, Your will be done on earth as in Heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
