#### Genesis 22:1-14 - New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition

22 After these things God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" #### Sermon

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirt, amen.



We've just sung a hymn written by Henry Newman called: *Lead Kindly Light*. This hymn was written by Henry Newman. He had been dangerously ill in Sicily and homesick for three weeks. On his way back to Marseille, France, in a boat, he wrote it. Perhaps it was his response to being tested by his illness, where writing the hymn may have comforted him.

Today's reading from Genesis is about responding to testing. Many of us will experience being tested some time in our life.

It seems Abraham's faith is tested when he realises, he's going to lose all God has blessed him with and promised him. His son Isaac and his future.

I wonder if Sarah knew he was taking Isaac to be sacrificed. Perhaps she was deeply

grieved at this cruel choice.

Abraham's response to God is to say: Here I am.

His fundamental belief is God is good and will provide a lamb.

His response to his sons' concerns is: *Here I am*. He is there for his child.

When it comes to the moment of testing when he is about to sacrifice his son, God sends two messengers, angels, who call out his name.

He responds by saying: Here I am.

The Lord provides a lamb, and it is sacrificed.

Abraham names the place, The Lord will provide.

Nothing seems to shake Abraham's faith in God. He is relentless in his belief in God's goodness.

Perhaps he refused to allow pain to colour his perception of God, where it may have affected him deeply, his faith, attitudes, relationships and more. Perhaps he saw this crisis as a moment in his life.

The story challenges us.

What kind of God gives and then takes? What kind of God asks someone to kill their child?

What's more challenging is Abraham's response.

He is obedient and is prepared to sacrifice Isaac.

Yet, he doesn't give in to despair or give up. He keeps on hoping.

I wonder if Abraham prayed for God to change his mind.

Some of us may have read the book *When Bad things happen to Good People* by Harold S Kushner. He writes: *We can't pray that God will make our life free of problems.* 

Perhaps a crisis can either be like a race, a sprint, which is intense and lasts for a short time or a long-distance race that takes endurance, where there are lots of problems and burdens that seem to drag on forever and are exhausting. Some people give in to the crisis, while others find strength through their faith.

Life can test us.

Many pray and invite others to join them, and this may help them find strength and peace. Whether there is good news or bad news they are not alone.

Sometimes hope is lost. I visited Gethsemane in the early 1990's. It's one of the saddest places I've ever been to. When I arrived, I felt the sadness and began to cry and asked a Franciscan to remove the chains from around a large rock Jesus was said to have prayed on and sweated blood when he struggled with accepting suffering and crucifixion. I sat on this rock for a long time, crying. I was grieving at the time. What came to me in the darkness was the words: Living hope.



I looked this up later on in 1 Peter and discovered we receive new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. Later I asked the Franciscan: Why do people have to suffer? His response was: For the glory of God. His comment wasn't comforting at the time. I can understand now.

The crisis did pass for Abraham and Isaac. God intervened at the last moment.

I've been listening to people whose faith has been tested by aging.

Losing their independence

Losing their licence

Losing loved ones

Losing their health

Losing their home

Losing most of their possessions

Sometimes people say there are good days and bad days. They are suffering deeply.

Sometimes people say I have a choice to give up or to make the best of it.

Many pray for miracles and are angry when the problem or crisis doesn't go away, and their prayers remain unanswered.

Others pray for God to work through doctors and nurses and for successful operations or treatment and their loved one may feel reassured they are not facing the crisis alone.

We often hear of people losing their entire families due to a tragedy and responding by beginning a foundation in their loved one's name, that benefits thousands. Harold Kushner wrote his book to make sense of his young son being diagnosed with a degenerative disease.

Harold tells a story of a survivor of the Holocaust rebuilding his life and having a new family only to lose them in a bushfire. He had a choice. Demand an investigation and focus on his pain and ask: *Why me*? He was obviously distraught and grieving and people would have supported him in this choice. Yet he chose to live for something and not to give into the pain. He rebuilt his life again.

Perhaps what's happening for Abraham and others like him is despite what's happening to them they continue to trust God and have hope, no matter how awful things become.

The story is meant to encourage us to have faith and trust in God, no matter what happens to us and to choose life, and not give up and run the race with perseverance.
