Sermon – Rev Tina

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen

Have you ever been distracted by many tasks? So distracted, you've asked a guest to intervene in a family dispute? I'm not sure our culture would approve or Martha's. I don't know whether I'd be game.

What if it made the guest uncomfortable? What if they were offended and didn't want to visit again? That's not hospitality!

Martha said: Tell Mary to help me!

We can understand where Martha is coming from. Perhaps Jesus didn't make an appointment, like people do in our culture. He simply may have arrived, and Martha probably had to go to the market, ask for food from neighbours or use up their stock of food and she may have spent hours preparing the meal. This was a culture that offered hospitality. It was expected. Martha was feeling frustrated. We all feel frustrated at times.

Once a year I have a get together with family and friends and spend days planning the meal, shopping and cleaning and cooking. Nagging my poor saint of a husband to help. When they all arrive, I'm busy in the kitchen preparing food for the feast and setting tables. Making sure everything is just right. I say: I enjoy it. When they say: Sit down, join us.

I haven't seen them for ages and this year, if it happens, it will be the first time since 2019. Sometimes I ask myself: What's more important? Perhaps I will make the feast a simple one this year and spend time with my guests. Yes, I can understand where Martha is coming from. So does Jesus. He says: *Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part which will not be taken from her.*

Of course, in those days Mary's actions were counter cultural. Men got to sit at Jesus' feet, while women stayed in the kitchen. Perhaps Jesus is inviting Martha to join Mary and sit at his feet. I wonder if Martha got it and understood and accepted the invitation. I wonder if she was able to put aside her fussing and busyness and take on the role of a disciple.

I wonder if Martha realised there was enough food. I'm sure Jesus would have been happy with olive oil, bread, olives, a bowl of veggies and glass of wine and perhaps some cheese. What on earth was Martha cooking that took so much time and effort?

But this is easier said than done. When we invite people into our homes, we tidy things up and cook or buy something special to offer our guests and when they arrive, we invite them into our lounge and spend time with our guest. This is expected in our culture. We do like to fuss and look after our guests.

I grew up in Gippsland where everyone knew 4:00 PM was afternoon teatime and there was an open invitation for family or neighbours to drop by for a cuppa or scones or cake or biscuits. Or a slab of cheese, homemade salami and olives and a glass of wine.

What Jesus is saying is he's happy with whatever food is offered. What's more important is to spend time with him. Life is short. Family and friends need not fuss over him, just be with him. He doesn't have high expectations or set rules or boundaries.

All are welcome and equally valued and loved.

Faith is greater than food.

Pastoral Care tips - Rev Tina



An awful lot of church is done in our kitchens, with conversations over the table with loved ones. I've lived in several homes now and every time people visit, they head for the kitchen, and we sit around the table having conversations with food and drink. We spend a lifetime in kitchens and before we know it, life is nearly over and we come to the place we have always visited and know it for the first time as a home church, a place where we have come to know God through others.

I have several books that speak of this:

The kitchen congregation, a memoir by Nora Seton about all the conversations she has had in the kitchen over her lifetime.

Radical Hospitality by Daniel Horman, about hospitality beginning within our hearts.

Leunig's book, A common Prayer, which has a saying:

Love is like Bread. It has to be made fresh every day.

Our kitchen in our home on Gabo Island Lighthouse had a large wood-fired stove. My Dad used to make bread and the smell used to drift throughout the entire house. In the same way when we sit at Jesus' feet or with another person in his presence, love, like bread, is made and drifts throughout our home, body and soul.
