Acts 2:1-21

2 When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. ² And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³ Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. ⁴ All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

⁵ Now there were devout Jews from every people under heaven living in Jerusalem. ⁶ And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. ⁷ Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? ⁸ And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? ⁹ Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰ Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, ¹¹ Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." ¹² All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" ¹³ But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

¹⁴ But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Fellow Jews^[a] and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. ¹⁵ Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. ¹⁶ No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: ¹⁷ 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.

¹⁸ Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit, and they shall prophesy. ¹⁹ And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. ²⁰ The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. ²¹ Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

⁸To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, ⁹to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, ¹⁰to another the working of powerful deeds, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. ¹¹All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

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Sermon – Rev Andrew

In German there is a word zeitgeist; you may know it. Zeitgeist. It means the spirit of the times, the spirit in the air. Of course, the spirit of our time – whatever time in history that might be – doesn't just descend on us as hapless victims but is the outcome of the ideas and beliefs that we affirm and embrace – maybe given to us by others – family, schooling, church, the media. These ways of thinking about the world though is like the air we breathe, the water we swim in – we affirm and embrace the zeitgeist often without questioning this spirit or interrogating its origins.

Maybe the term we in the church use for the zeitgeist is simply the expression: the world. There is something about this term, the world, which implies a kind of blindness to the way things are. Blindness to the zeitgeist. But we in the church are no less likely to be seduced by the zeitgeist of our time than those who are not part of the church. We have to be alert; watchful.

If you have been paying attention to the news in the last week you will know that the highly respected aboriginal journalist Stan Grant has been attacked and victimised as a result of comments he made during the broadcast of the coronation on ABC TV. As a consequence of the extreme vilification towards him, and his family and the lack of support he has received from ABC management – who encouraged him to comment on the legacy of colonialism on indigenous people during the coronation broadcast, Stan has stepped out of the journalistic world for a time. He has done so with great dignity, without recrimination, or bitterness, but with great sadness. One of his reasons for stepping out is he says to reflect on his own role as a member of the media, of the fourth estate, who Stan says are as much of the problem in creating the climate of bitter vitriol as anyone else. In a piece published by the ABC last Friday Stan wrote about the role that the media has come to play in public life:

the media has turned public discussion into an amusement park. Social media, at its worst, is a sordid spectacle. A grotesque burlesque. Lives are reduced to mockery and ridicule.

I want no part of it, Stan writes. I want to find a place of grace far from the stench of the media. I want to go where I am not reminded of the social media sewer.

In a way what Stan is saying that the media have come to play a role in our society that is debauching us; that it is corrupting the zeitgeist of our time; corrupting the spirit of our time.

We have heard just now two accounts from gospel writers of the giving of the spirit. Firstly, from the gospel writer Luke – the account we know so well – set on the day of Pentecost, where the disciples are inflamed by tongues, as of fire. The other account of the giving of the spirit comes from the gospel of John, happening on the day of the resurrection where Jesus comes to the frightened disciples behind locked doors and breathes the spirit on them. As God at the creation breathes breath into the man of dust, Adam, so Jesus breathes the spirit into the disciples, bringing into being a new creation.

This giving of the spirit in the Gospel of John is a fulfillment of what Jesus has said to the disciples earlier: 'If you love me, you will keep[±] my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate,[±] to be with you for ever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be among you.

We can be inclined to think about the holy spirit as some kind of disembodied spirit which roams freely about the world. Certainly, Jesus says to Nicodemus: *The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.'* But the teaching of Jesus about the spirit is that the spirit is that bond between the father and the son. As children of the father ourselves and as brothers and sisters of Jesus we can affirm and celebrate the presence of the spirit in us and between us, as Jesus says to the disciples in the room behind locked doors. *he abides with you, and he will be among you.*

This spirit of truth opens our eyes to the zeitgeist, the world's ways of doing things and enables us to speak and to act in ways that witness to the kingdom of God present here with us. The zeitgeist says – this is the way things are; we just have to accept this. But the Holy spirit of Jesus says - this is the way things are with the kingdom of heaven; will you join me in the sharing in God's deeds of power that show the grace and mercy of God. Jesus invites us to abide in this truth of the spirit of God; to both see the lie which often passes for the truth – to name the lie and yet also to live by love because we are committed to the way of Jesus; abiding in the father's love. So may we pray Come Holy Spirit, abandoning ourselves to the grace and mercy of God and living by God's spirit of freedom and joy.

Poverty and Kids Hope

My name is Corry, and I'm the current coordinator of our church's Kids Hope Program in Burwood Heights PS. Today's media is telling us that the cost of living is forcing many families into poverty. We are all feeling the pinch. So, what must life be like for those who have been in poverty for two or more generations?

Poverty is the lack of resources that influence achievement in life. For many kids these resources include not only lack of money.

They may also lack the ability to choose and control emotional responses or the intellectual ability and skills to deal with everyday life.

Spiritual, health & mobility resources may be limited.

But most importantly they lack **Support Systems & Role Models** – friends, family and viable backups in times of need. They lack frequent access to adults who are appropriate and nurturing and who do not engage in self-destructive behaviour.

Kids Hope gives us the opportunity to make a real difference. Each kid in our Kids Hope Program this year is chosen by the school and is 'living in poverty' by the definition I have just outlined. Our church/ We are providing mentors (8 at the moment) who spend one hour a week with one child as a supportive friend and role model.

With Prayer Partner support, we mentors put our prayers into action in the hope that these kids will not end up in the statistics for mental health issues, drug addiction or incarceration in our prisons, as so many of our kids caught in generational poverty do.

Kids Hope mentoring is so rewarding. We see the difference we are making...raising their self-esteem and confidence. **Corry Skilbeck**

LinC Whitehorse

LinC (Love in the name of Christ), is a voluntary organization within the Whitehorse Council Community. "ORDINARY PEOPLE doing ORDINARY THINGS, making an EXTRAORDINARY DIFFERENCE in our community". It's a volunteer organization with Volunteers from various Christian Churches in the area, i.e. Uniting, Anglican & Baptist at present. It's to assist people with practical short or medium-term needs.

Aim; to meet practical needs which are not met by existing community welfare agencies, to those in need, regardless of their belief, gender, or ethnic background.

The clients can be self-referred, or from an agency. The Referral Centre is located in a Mitcham Office. This Centre is operated by two members, each Monday & Thursday morning from 9-12am. There's an answering machine to leave messages that come in, during the rest of the week. These are dealt with, the next day the Office is open. These can be from an agency or individual.

All volunteers are trained to help clients with care, compassion and without discrimination, respecting the client's confidentially at all times. All volunteers have police checks, and most have working with children checks. Services offered; Visiting/friendship, home help, transport to appointments/shopping, mowing & garden maintenance (not weeding), minor home repairs, and shopping assistance are mostly the requests needed at present.

LinC supports; families in need or difficulty, elderly & infirm, single parents, people with disabilities, people confined to home.

A recently started service is LinC Call. This service is for people who are shut-in, lonely, anxious, not able to get out of home, who would like a weekly phone call to hear from another person. All these volunteers are specially trained for this. They are matched up with a volunteer who has similar interests etc. so the call is positive for them.

There have been many members in the Mitcham Congregation that have been volunteers over the past 22yrs. Unfortunately, there are only two of us at present, Eddie Short, who now only assesses larger jobs, and myself and I mostly work in the Referral Centre on alternate Thursday mornings.

LinC can be called on 9873 2293 at any time and if there's no-one there, a message can be left on the answering machine. We are looking for more volunteers. If anyone is interested, please speak to Eddie Short or me for more information.

I have enjoyed volunteering and being involved with Centre 81 - however I haven't been as involved as are Jill and the other members of the committee - especially during COVID-19 time.

Earlier on when Centre 81 was being set up, I did the Roster for the Volunteers. I found that it took a bit of juggling as I would be told when someone wasn't able to attend - sometimes at short notice - so then there was the need to ring around to find a replacement.

While having been a Receptionist once a month from the beginning - the lady who then for several years shared the time with me, didn't drive, and I would pick her up.

We found that shortly after Centre 81 commenced - that the Receptionists enjoyed having time together - first of all to be able to help anyone who called in - and secondly having the chance (if time permitted) to chat and get to know one another.

(And I am now guessing that if and when someone had health problems - it could have been a chance for the person having a problem to share it with another who would listen, and support). To me it is a very well supported experience. **Aileen Youngs**
