Mark 9:2-9

² Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. Sermon – Rev Peter



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So what's the truth? Who do you believe?

Listen to him...

A sermon by Rev Peter

What's the truth? Who do you believe? The recent decision by Prime Minister Albanese and his government to change the Stage 3 tax cuts has been declared by some sections of the media to demonstrate they lied to the Australian public. On the other hand, it is presented as a government responsive to the needs of a struggling community in the midst of cost-of-living pressures. Paul Barry from the ABC's "Media Watch" program examined the media's response, highlighting the duplicitous attitude of the Murdoch media who when Prime Minister Abbott broke numerous election promises, promoted the change as good and appropriate. Not so more recently when the other side of politics change their policies and approach.

For most of us, we will have formed our view based on our political leanings. Such leaning will have been formed over many years due to our own particular context and circumstances. How were we raised? Were we business

owners or executives? Or were we workers and union members? What media do we read or follow? What do our friends and family think? What groups are we members of? These, alongside our life experiences all inform our perspective.

Does that mean we now live in a post-truth world? Or is there something we can hang on to?

With St Valentine's Day just around the corner, I am reminded of one of the important dimensions of making marriages and relationships work. Psychologists Nan Silver and John Gottman identified 7 key principles at play in positive relationships and the first they called a "love map". A corny title but none the less expressive of what it is.

In positive relationships, the members develop a knowledge of the others in the group (in a marriage, of their partner). They are interested in the stories, experiences, likes and dislikes and various aspects of the lives of the others in their group. It is about understanding the other/s.

I get to know how my friend likes their tea (or coffee or ...). I learn about how they like to spend their free time. Do they like reading or would they rather go to the movies. None of this is sleazy but rather to develop an appreciation and rapport. Such a "love map" takes time and requires a constant updating of that knowledge for the sake of the other.

It is a privilege to be given such knowledge of another. It involves trust and graciousness.

In our reading from Mark's Gospel, a deep intimate knowledge of Jesus is shared with Peter, James and John. Jesus is seen alongside of the greatest heroes of Jewish history. It is also shared with us, the readers. We are also let in on that knowledge. In Mark's Gospel, few understand it. At the time, the disciples didn't either. But in the right context, the revealing takes shape into understanding.

The key is the instruction given after the vision by the voice from the clouds, "listen to him (Jesus)". Listening to him builds our relationship and rapport. It is life-giving for ourselves and others.

Listen.

That is the only way we really learn about each other and for that matter about Jesus, about God, and about where we fit into it all. We start to get an image of intimacy. A cherishing, a connection with God and Christ that is about learning and following.

When we think we have it solved or the answers, we become like Peter. We impose our solutions and attitudes on what we think should happen. But if we take time to listen, to observe, we begin to notice the nudging of the Spirit of God in ways we may not have expected.

Pastoral Care Tips – Rev Tina



Around Christmas, during my first placement, I was invited each year to bless the fleet. Dozens of fire trucks from the Nillumbik council area would line up on the council offices' lawns to have their crews and trucks blessed. The mayor, the person in charge of the CFA for that district and myself, would address the crews. Police would also attend. Then I'd do the blessing and say the firefighter's prayer, and afterwards we would have a meal and each of the crews would receive a grant of money from the council. Most crews came from towns in the area, such as Kangaroo Ground.

While we were eating, I'd listen to the volunteers' stories about fires heading straight for them and their truck or fire tower, and the wind changing at the last minute. Often, after traumatic fires they'd have get-togethers for everyone and their families to share stories and offer support to each other. They'd often say: *When your number's up, it's up*. They were brave men and women and often families volunteered. They'd put their life on the line for communities.

What they do is inspiring. Their way of offering and receiving support and their attitudes can teach us a lot about self-care and living well, contributing, and going that extra mile for others.

I invite you to say a prayer for them, for all firefighters, in this country and throughout the world.
